The schedule for the tournament is as follows:

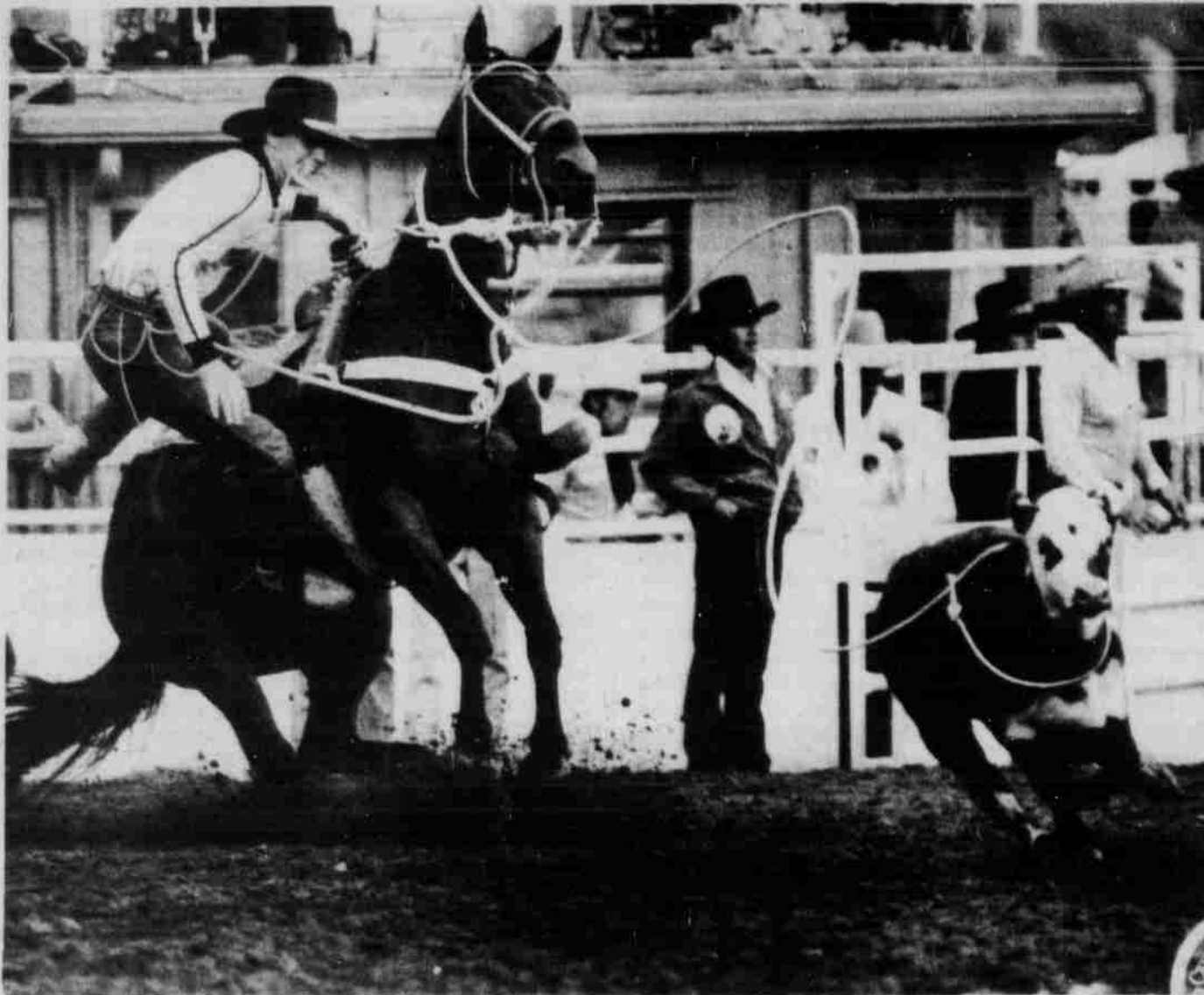
- Round 1: July 26 - August 8;

Bacterial Standards Exceeded in the City of Heppner water Supply. The City of Heppner reports that the water supply failed to meet Federal bacteriological standards during the April-May-June, 1981, quarter. Analysis of monthly drinking water samples indicated that the June sample was positive for coliform organisms and that this result exceeded the limit allowed by law. The coliform organism is used as an indicator of microbiological quality, and while these organisms pose no threat to health, their presence does indicate that a source of contamination might exist somewhere in the water system. An investigation was initiated by the City as soon as the positive sample was reported. Chlorination was immediately instituted and subsequent samples of the drinking water were negative to coliform.
