Vacation time is over for homemakers involved in the OSU Extension Service Family Living programs.

Study Groups in Morrow and Umatilla counties traditionally start activities with a September organizational meeting followed closely by training sessions for those who will present study topics at fall meetings.

Three study topics will be presented simultaneously on Sept. 29, 10 a.m. at Peace Lutheran Church, Pendleton.

"Home Heating Alternatives" will be the subject of a training session by OSU Extension Housing and Energy Management specialist, Suzanne Badenhop. Timed to meet concerns of consumers regarding rapidly rising costs of utilities as well as energy conservation, Ms. Badenhop will offer information regarding home heating alternatives, both old and new.

Forestry Dept. lists restrictions

The Department of Forestry, East Central Oregon District, has released the following regulations regarding fire control:

Hot, dry weather has caused fire danger to be extremely high in the Wheeler, Morrow and Gilliam counties and those counties have been placed under a regulated closure as of Sept. 21 by state and federal officials.

The following requirements and restrictions will be enforced.

Smoking is prohibited while traveling in timber, brush or grass areas except in vehicles on roads.

The above listed lands are hereby closed to building a camp, cooking, warming, or other open fire, including charcoal fires, except at improved campgrounds or locations designated by the forester. Portable cooking stoves using liquidified or bottled fuel are permissible.

Use of chainsaws in timber, brush and grass areas for non-industrial use is prohibited between the hours of 1 p.m. and 8 p.m.

All motorized vehicles, including motorcycles and all terrain vehicles except vehicles on industrial operations under permit and vehicles used in agricultural work are restricted to improved roads. Improved roads are roads that have been constructed for automotive use and are maintained clear of flammable debris.

The one day event will offer study group leaders the chance to get together and renew friendships as well as the time and energy saving aspects of car pooling. Another plus for the triple training is having leaders "tooled up" and ready to present all the topics chosen for fall meetings.
