

# Mustangs beat Trojans, ranked third in state

The Heppner Mustangs once again proved why they were ranked No. three in the state, as the Mustangs stepped over the Lyle-Klickitat Trojans, 27-6, Fri., Oct. 16.

Although the score showed a handy win for the Mustangs, the Trojans gave them a run for their money.

Coach John Sporseen commented after the game, "Lyle was an extremely tough team one of the toughest we've faced this year."

The first half was a defensive battle except for occasional breaks for scoring such as Cliff Dougherty's touchdown catch of 12 yards from quarterback Doug Holland. Dougherty's touchdown put the Mustangs on top 7-0 at the end of the first half.

Holland came out firing the ball during the second half as he hit John Murray for an 89 yard touchdown pass. Holland also ran two yards for a touchdown.

During the fourth quarter, Earl Hammond contributed his six points to the Mustangs' scoring drive.

The Trojans got on the board late in the fourth quarter by an 18 yard inter-

ception return.

Murray led in the rushing department with 124 yards on 18 carries, followed by Holland with 46 yards on 8 carries. Hammond was also on top with nine carries for 36 yards.

Holland completed five out of 10 passes for 158 yards.

In the defensive category, Holland led the Mustangs with 15 points, followed by Lee Rice with 11 and Hammond with 10.

Next week the Mustangs will be at home against the Pilot Rock Rockets. The game begins at 8 p.m. The game will

conclude Heppner's Homecoming week.

# Cardinals win over Wheeler Falcons 88-76

By the looks of the final score it could have been a basketball game, but it was a football game as the lone Cardinals defeated the Wheeler Falcons 88-76.

The Cardinals started off scoring 20 points before they had run one offensive play. Jeff Hams received the opening kickoff and ran it back 89 yards for a touchdown. The pass for the extra points failed.

On the Falcons first possession of the ball Jeff Hams intercepted a Falcon pass and ran 37 yards for a touchdown. Howard Leavitt ran in for the extra points.

Jeff Hams remained a threat to the Falcons as he again intercepted a Falcon pass and ran it back 70 yards for a touchdown. The pass for the extra points failed. The score at the end of the quarter showed lone on top 20-0.

The Falcons scored their first touchdown of the game on a 42 yard pass to Bill MacInnes from quarterback Scott Asher. The run for the extra points failed.

The Falcons again scored on a pass play with the same combination from 31 yards out. Asher ran in for the extra points to make the score 20-14.

Lone's fourth touchdown came on a 71 yard run by a sophomore Howard Leavitt. The pass for the extra points failed. The Falcons were once again intercepted by Jeff Hams as he sprinted 36 yards for his fourth touchdown of the game. The pass for the extra points was no good.

Falcon quarterback Scott

Asher scored on a four yard run to close the scoring for the half. Hubbell ran in for the extra points to make the half time score 40-22 for the Cardinals.

The Falcons scored the first touchdown of the second half on a six yard pass to Jim Wimer. Asher ran in for the extra points. Jeff Hams opened up the scoring for the Cardinals in the second half when he broke away on a 26 year run into the end zone. The run for the extra points failed.

The Falcon's Asher and MacInnes combined for an 80 yard touchdown pass. Hubbell ran in for the extra points.

It was lone's turn to score next as quarterback Denny Starr hit Tim Patton with a 25 yard touchdown pass. The run for the extra points failed. Wimer scored the next touchdown for the Falcons on a 78 yard kickoff return, to make the score 52-44.

The Cardinals next touchdown came when Tim Patton ran the kickoff back 60 yards for a touchdown. The run for the extra points failed.

The Falcon's came back to score on a 58 yard pass to MacInnes. Asher ran in for the extra points. Jeff Hams' last touchdown of the game came on a 70 yard kickoff return to end the third quarter 64-52.

The Cardinals wasted no time in the third quarter as Starr hit Craig Hams with a 36 yard touchdown pass. Jeff Hams ran in for the extra points.

Hubbell scored next for the Falcons on a seven yard run. On lone's next possession of the ball Craig Hams pushed through from one yard out to

The Falcons scored next when Asher hit Rubien for a two yard touchdown pass. The same combination scored for the extra points.

On lone's last possession of the ball Jeff Hams broke away for 60 yards the lateraled the pigskin to guard Steve Millman who ran 25 yards into the endzone. Leavitt ran in for the extra points.

The last touchdown of the game was a 60 yard Falcon pass to MacInnes. Wimer ran in for the extra points to close the scoring at 88-76.

The Cardinals amassed 397 yards rushing. Leading rushers were Jeff Hams with 192 yards, and Howard Leavitt with 125 yards. In the passing department Denny Starr was five of 16 for 72 yards. The Falcons rushed for 226 yards

with Asher accounting for 121 and MacInnes 71 yards. Asher also passed for 346 yards hitting 13 out of 33 passes.

Next action for the Cardinals will be Saturday, October 24, at Dufur. Kickoff time will be at 1:30 p.m.

## Mustangs closer to playoff

The Heppner Mustangs took their plans for a state playoff berth one step further by defeating the Wasco County Redsides 33-6, Friday night Oct. 9 at Maupin.

Though the score was all for Heppner, the Mustangs were plagued by penalties.

Coach John Sporseen commented after the game, "We have to stop getting unnecessary penalties. The game should have been over by the first half."

The Mustangs had 155 yards in penalties compared to the Redside's 55 yards. Penalties made the difference in several cases. In the second quarter,

Lee Rice intercepted a pass and ran it back to the one yard line, but unfortunately it was called back by a clipping penalty. John Murray also had a similar experience, in which his touchdown was nullified by a personal foul in the third quarter.

Neither of the two teams could generate much offense until late in the second quarter, when Mustang running back Earl Hammond rambled into the endzone from 11 yards out.

The Mustangs came alive during the third quarter when quarterback Doug Holland connected with Robert Bier for a nine yard touchdown. Murray then proceeded 10 yards for another touchdown. Holland and Bier connected once again, this time for 27 yards and six points.

The Redside's finally got something going in the third quarter with a two yard plunge into the endzone.

The Mustangs put one more touchdown on the board before the end of the game. Hammond struck once again with a one yard plunge, this upped the score to 33-6.

Murray led the Mustangs in rushing with 134 yards in 22 carries. Hammond followed close behind with 82 yards in 13 carries and Holland had nine carries for 52 yards.

Holland completed four out of eight passes for 83 yards and two touchdowns. Jeff Orr completed a pass on an extra point conversion.

Rice led the defensive department with 14 points, followed by Murray with 12. Dorian Forrar was also in

double digits with 10 points.
