Episcopal Diocese holds convention

The Rt. Rev. Rustin R. Kinsey presided at a special convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Eastern Oregon, held in Bend on November 21. The purpose of this convention was to decide on whether the Episcopal Church in Oregon would enter into a Venture In Mission Campaign to raise \$358,000 for mission projects in the Diocese, in the nation, and others on an international scale.

The vote of the convention was overwhelmingly favorable. The campaign will begin on January 4, 1982 and continue for three months, said a spokesperson.

The Rev. H. Paul Osborne, a church fund raising consultant from Harrison, Kentucky has been employed by the Diocese to direct the campaign.

The projects of particular interest to Oregonians are: \$5,000 partial funding of a senior citizens van in Nysa; \$2,000 for emergency medical supplies in Bonanza; \$1,500 for radio base station for emergency medical communications on the Piute Indian Reservation; \$6,000 for social service commission to adopt and modify the model in Burns to assist the unemployed and to provide this model to other communities; \$7,500 for the Mid Columbia Attention Home in The Dalles; \$32,500 for the Meadowood Springs Speech Camp; \$4,000 to develop the LaGrande model in dealing with chronically mentally ill adults and \$8,000 for the Alcohol Recovery Program in Ontario.

Bishop Kinsey in commenting on the action of his diocese said, "We are gratified for our church in Eastern Oregon to move from maintaining ourselves to engaging in mission. We believe that our purpose is to bring healing to the brokenness of the world and this is a beginning."

The Venture In Mission Campaign will lead to a Diocesan-wide rally to be held in Pendleton on February 12, 1982. The Rt. Rev. John E. Hines, former Presiding Bishop of the Episcopal Church has been invited to be the speaker.
