

Cardinal boys defeated by Mustangs

The Cardinal varsity boys were defeated by the Heppner Mustangs 33-74 on Saturday, December 19.

Dorian Forrar scored nine points in the first quarter to lead the Mustangs to a 4-16 lead over the Cardinals.

The Mustangs outscored the Cardinals in the second quarter as they took a 15-34 lead at the half.

The Cardinals were outscored badly in the third quarter as the Mustangs

dominated the scoring and took a 21-57 lead into the final quarter.

The Mustangs capped the victory in the final quarter as they scored 17 points to take a 33-74 victory over the Cardinals.

Craig Gutierrez led the Cardinals with 12 points, followed by Donnie Taylor with nine.

The Cardinals shot 13 of 49 for 26 percent from the field and seven of 20 for 35 percent from the line. The Mustangs

shot 34 of 77 for 44 percent from the field and six of 19 for 32 percent from the free throw line.

Santa's Workshop — 10 percent of school board questionnaires returned

If you were one of over 300 people who returned a school district questionnaire last month, the school board reviewed your responses at its meeting Monday night.

Three thousand questionnaires seeking district patron's responses on questions ranging from sex education to academics, were mailed out in November.

Monday night the board was told by Superintendent Matt Doherty that 10 percent of the questionnaires had come back in.

Twenty-eight questions asked, including: I think the schools place enough emphasis on academics. And I think students should receive more sex education instructions.

Four responses, ranging from strongly agree to strongly disagree (plus a not applicable) were available to mark.

"This will be a good tool, if you want to judge some public thought on an issue. But remember it's only 10 percent," Doherty told the board.

Lions ask area residents to give gift of sight

As the holiday season unfolds, the Oregon Lions Eye Bank asks Heppner area residents to consider "giving the gift of sight" so that people blinded by corneal disease can regain their vision through a corneal transplant operation, stated a recent news release from Good Samaritan Hospital and Medical Center, Portland.

"Corneal damage is a major cause of blindness, but today more than 90 percent of transplant operations are successful," said Kristi Voth, executive director of the Oregon Lions Eye Bank based at Good Samaritan. More than 900 Oregonians have had their sight restored with corneas furnished by the eye bank.

The eye bank receives and preserves human donor eyes and makes them available to physicians whose patients need corneal transplant surgeries. The only source of tissue is the donation of eyes of recently-deceased persons.

The cornea is the transparent covering that overlays the iris and pupil, and works with

the lens to focus light rays entering the eye. When the cornea is diseased or injured, sight may be restored by transplanting a clear cornea from a donor eye.

Everyone, regardless of the quality of his or her vision, can participate in the eye bank program by becoming a potential eye donor because "the need for tissue far exceeds the number of corneas obtained," Ms. Voth said.

If 18 years old or older those interested may sign a donor card in the presence of two witnesses, and carry the card at all times. Eyes of a deceased relative may also be donated if the person donating is the next of kin and over 18 years old, the news release continued.

Donor cards may be obtained from Terry Hughes, president of the Heppner Lions club, or any club member, or by contacting the eye bank, (503) 229-7523.

The Oregon Lions Eye Bank is supported by more than 200 Lions clubs throughout Oregon, and is a member of the Oregon Donor Program.
