

Mustangs win over Wahtonka in tough contest, 60-54

The Heppner Mustangs went into their contest with Wahtonka last Saturday night knowing they would have a game on their hands—and they did.

Neither team could muster more than a three point lead throughout the close encounter, until the Mustangs, with the help of some clutch freethrow shooting in the final minutes, were able to pull out a 60-54 victory over the strong team from The Dalles.

"Fouls by Wahtonka in the last three minutes put us ahead," commented Head Coach Dale Holland.

Heppner reserve Mike Currin came off the bench in the final minutes to score one field goal and pot a crucial four of four from the foul line.

Doug Holland also scored two of two from the line in the closing minutes, and John Murray recovered his own miss to score a field goal, get fouled and make the shot to put the Mustangs over the top.

"Lott, Bier, Forrar and Holland all played a good game for us," said Holland.

"This was an important win for us. We knew it was going to be tough to go in there and come out with a win."

"They are a very deliberate ball club," said Holland, and the Mustangs had a tough time containing Wahtonka's stand-out forward, 6'3" Mike Byers, who scored 28 points.

The Mustangs play Pilot Rock this Friday at Pilot Rock, and they come back Saturday to play Sherman at home. "They'll be tough," said Holland.

Cards defeated by Helix Grizzlies

The Cardinal varsity boys surprised everybody as they came from behind and tied with the Helix Grizzlies in regular game time, Friday night. The Cardinals were defeated 56-62 in overtime.

The Cardinals jumped out to an 11-6 first quarter lead. The Grizzlies came back in the second quarter to take a one point half-time lead, 27-28.

In the third quarter the Cardinals were outscored by seven as the Grizzlies took a 36-44 lead into the fourth quarter.

The Cardinals hit some crucial free throws in the final quarter to send the game into overtime, tied at 50.

The Grizzlies hit four of five free throws in overtime as they took a victory over the Cardinals.

The Cardinals shot 21 of 43 for 49 percent from the field and 14 of 20 for 70 percent from the charity stripe. The Grizzlies shot 25 of 63 for 40 percent from the field and 12 of 25 for 48 percent from the free throw line.

According to Coach Del LaRue, this was the Cardinals' best effort of the season. "We played well enough that

we deserved to win, but we just couldn't pull it out."

Eighteen diversified projects were selected at a convention in Bend in November, 1981, including the development and training of volunteers for a hospice program, aid to the self-help project of gleaning, and support for Cuttington College in Liberia. "The money will be committed to people who need help, not to perpetuation of programs to raise money," she added.

Two rally dinners for the VIM campaign will feature the Former Presiding Bishop of the Episcopal Church, Bishop John E. Hines, as speaker. Dinners will be held on February 12 in Pendleton and on February 14 at Klamath Falls.

As Presiding Bishop, Bishop Hines was in Pendleton 10 years ago to bring Eastern Oregon from Mission Status to

the independent status of the Diocese of Eastern Oregon. His vision of mission brought many changes to the Episcopal Church during his leadership, said Krier.

Jim Foster of The Dalles and the Reverend Larry Ferguson of Hood River serve as co-chairmen of the Venture in Mission campaign. Norm Shroth of Hermiston and Frank Anderson of Heppner, in charge of Advance-Challenge Gifts, say that approximately 25 percent of the money has been pledged. The campaign to fund these 18 separate projects will continue through March and will be directed by the Reverend H. Paul Osborne, church fund raising consultant from Garrison, Kentucky.

Offices for Venture in Mission will be at the Diocesan Office in The Dalles, Krier concluded.
