**PROPOSAL**  
SHALL MORROW COUNTY LEVY \$2,825,300 OUTSIDE OREGON CONSTITUTIONAL LIMITATION FOR ALL COUNTY OPERATIONS DURING FISCAL YEAR 1982-83.

**PURPOSE**  
The purpose of this levy is to provide funds to balance the Morrow County operating budget, and the Morrow County Hospital and Clinic budgets for 1982-83.

**EXPLANATION**  
The Morrow County tax base for 1982-83 will be \$413,473. This levy with anticipated receipts from all sources, will not finance expenditures for General Fund, Roads, General School Funds, Cities portion of Road Funds and operation of the Hospital and North Morrow County Clinic. Increases are due to inflation, existing labor contracts tied to cost of living and certain changes in hospital operations, plus 8% for uncollected taxes. The total levy will be \$3,238,773. If this measure is approved, \$2,583,056 of the taxes levied in the 1982-83 fiscal year are eligible for partial State funding. However, \$655,717 of the taxes levied will be totally financed by local taxpayers without any partial State payment.

**PROPOSAL**  
SHALL MORROW COUNTY SCHOOL DISTRICT LEVY \$4,206,506 OUTSIDE THE OREGON CONSTITUTIONAL LIMITATION FOR DISTRICT OPERATION DURING 1982-1983?

**PURPOSE**  
The district has authority to levy only the tax base of \$661,249. This sum, plus non-tax revenues, is not adequate to operate the schools. It is necessary to submit to the voters a levy request in excess of the tax base. The levy to finance the operating budget for 1982-83 is \$186,421 greater than the levy for 1981-82.

**EXPLANATION**  
Reasons for increases are cost of living increases in the form of salary and other benefits, increases in the cost of energy, purchased services, replacement, maintenance and general increases in all costs due to the universal inflation which effects purchases of all goods and services.

If this measure is approved \$4,401,613 of the taxes levied in the 1982-83 fiscal year are eligible for partial funding by the state. However, \$466,143 of the taxes will be totally financed by local taxpayers.
