Vote 'no' on 4

To the editor:
The state's roadway surface is cracking and a multi-billion dollar investment is being lost a pothold at a time. The legislature's solution, Measure 4 on the May ballot, is both inadequate and unfair. Ballot Measure 4 perpetuates the existing system and permits those who profit from our roadways to crush those roads and drive off paying for less than half of the damage. In addition, trucks between 16,000 and 72,000 lbs. now provide a dramatic subsidy of the heavier trucks.

Our organization proposes a rate structure based on an actual damage as estimated by the Department of Transportation. Ballot Measure 4 is based on lobby strength.

The spring, 1981 "Journal of Contemporary Studies" reports that while Oregon upgraded about 300 miles of the state highway system in the last two years, another 850 miles of pavement slipped to a deteriorated condition. Nearly 60 percent of Oregon's state highways suffer from moderate to extreme deterioration.

At face value, the 1981 legislature's response to this crisis—a call for equal increases of 36 percent in both gas and truck taxes—seems fair. However, the debate over Ballot Measure 4 can be put simply as a question of whether Oregon motorists wish to keep paying for highway damage they don't cause.

An American Association of State Highway Officials study reports that the axle of a heavy car can cross over the same spot 2,500 times before it does as much damage as one pass by the axle of a fully-loaded truck.

The Department of Transportation reports that heavy vehicles (over 6,000 pounds) are responsible for 90 percent of the surface damage done to Oregon roadways each year, weather nine percent and passenger vehicles just one percent. The department also estimates that travel by vehicles over 76,000 lbs. is increasing at four times the rate of overall traffic, accelerating road deterioration.

By defeating Ballot Measure 4, voters can tell the legislature that they will not be fiscal victims of lawmakers who bow to lobby pressures and refuse to sufficiently tax the industry most responsible for road damage.

By signing petitions to place a measure on the November ballot, raising truck taxes commensurate to damage caused, Oregonians can do, by initiative, what the legislature has refused to do on its own: require trucks to pay their fair share of the repair costs.

Vote "no" on 4 — support the Fair Truck Tax initiative.
