

Lone boys finish 2nd, girls 4th in Heppner track meet

On Tuesday, April 13 the lone Cardinal thinclads traveled to Heppner for a meet with Heppner, Echo, Sherman, Ukiah, Spray and Mitchell. The Cardinal boys finished second to Sherman with 109½ points. The Cardinal girls finished fourth with 40 points.

The Card boys placed in every event except the pole vault, where they had no one entered. Placing first for the boys was Denny Starr in the discus with a throw of 123'11", and Donnie Taylor in the intermediate hurdles with a time of 45.75.

Seconds were scored by Jeff Hams in the long jump with a leap of 19', the 100 meters with a time of 12.14 and in the 200 meters with a time of 25.6. Tim Patton in the 1,500 meters in 4:58.7, Starr in the javelin with a throw of 137'3", Taylor in the high hurdles in 19.48 and

Craig Hams with a triple jump of 35'5½".

Thirds were recorded by Craig Hams in the long jump 17'5", Patton in the high jump at 5'2", Mike Douglas in the 3,000 meters in 10:55.77, and Howard Leavitt in the triple jump with a leap of 34'1¼".

Fourth places were recorded by Starr in the triple jump with a jump of 34', Leavitt in the 400 meters with a time of 61.05, Patton in the 800 meters in 2:26.6, and Douglas in the 1,500 meters in 5:02.

Fifth place finishes were recorded by Donnie Doherty with a personal best of 33'8" in the shot put, Craig Hams in the 100 meters in 12.6, Leavitt in the high jump at 5'0" and Taylor in the long jump at 16'9½".

Sixth places were awarded to Jay Love in the shot put with a throw of 32'8", Randy McCabe in the javelin with a throw of 88'8", Scott Barnett in the discus with a throw of

90'5½", and Leavitt with a jump of 16'7" in the long jump.

The 400 meter relay team consisting of Andy Roberts, Barnett, McCabe and Doherty finished second in 60... as did the 11,000 meter team made up of Love, Doherty, McCabe and Douglas in 4:51.44.

In the girls meet, Michelle LaRue won the discus with a new school record of 79'7½", and placed third in the shot put with a throw of 25'5½".

Margaret Doherty finished second in the 400 meters in 65.96, the 200 meters in 29.16 in the long jump with a leap of 14' and third in the 100 meters with a time of 13.86.

Team scores for the girls were Sherman 132, Heppner 72, Echo 46, Ione 40, Ukiah 20, Spray three and Mitchell one. Boys scores were Sherman 103, Ione 109½, Heppner 33, Echo 23, Ukiah 20½, Mitchell two, and Spray zero.

The visitors to Heppner arrived about 1 p.m. on Sunday and their bus then took the Heppner folks west to reach Lynch Terrace about 5 p.m. Each group met host families and had brief orientations that afternoon and evening. All this week educational and interesting events have been planned for the switched-about students. West of the Cascades the Morrow County bunch visited Reynolds Metals, Clackamas Town Center and the Ice Capades Chalet, all on Monday; on Tuesday they toured suburban East-Multnomah County and the Sandy and Columbia River gorges, noted horticulture and picniced at Wahkeena Falls; yesterday they visited OMSI where they viewed the Planetarium Show "Universe in Motion" and looked over the Washington Park Zoo; today, a tour of Old Town in Portland and a good visit at the Oregon Historical Society are scheduled, and tomorrow they will see the Port of Portland, terminals six and four, and the ship repair yard; then from 7:30 to 9:30 p.m. they will be guests at a dance at the host school.

On Saturday, April 24, the Heppner School District will transport Lynch Terrace students home and return here with the Heppner students.

The Multnomah County visitors went out to Sand Hollow for a tour of dryland and irrigated wheat ranches on Monday and enjoyed a dinner put on by the Wheat League. Tuesday they rode to Hardman to visit that ghost town and then on to Rock Creek into the timber and to a wiener roast at Anson Wright Park. Wednesday they were taken to the Bulter Creek area to tour hay, sheep and cattle operations (arranged by the Cattlemen's Association) and they enjoyed a dinner (put on by the CowBelles.)

Today the students toured the Kinzua Mill, visited the County Museum and the little one-room schoolhouse and learned some of Morrow County's history. Tomorrow's big event will be the seventh and eighth grade dance at the school's multipurpose room from 7:30 to 10 p.m. On Saturday the visitors need to arrive at the school by 7:45 a.m. to begin their return home. They will carry sack lunches and will travel out the Bombing Range Road and will have a drive-by tour of some of the developments in the north end of the county, such as corporate farms, irrigation projects and food processing plants, and see the city of Boardman and the coal-fired plant before they continue west, expecting to be home by about 6:30 p.m. when the Heppner students will board their bus for their evening trip back here.
