

Hospital, North Morrow Clinic make purchases

Several health care items have been purchased by Pioneer Memorial Hospital for use by the hospital and by North Morrow Medical Center as a result of the Umatilla Hospital closure. Many items were put up for bid and others were grouped and given in lot numbers, announced A.K. Felt, Pioneer Memorial Hospital administrator.

The North Morrow Medical Center was successful in three out of five bids. Principal purchase was a laboratory microscope with a light source attachment. Pioneer Memorial Hospital bid \$761. The microscope, purchased new, would cost \$3,000, said Felt.

Another principal purchase was a continuous suction machine. Pioneer Memorial Hospital bid \$102. New, the machine would sell for \$450 Felt said. The other item purchased for the North Morrow Medical Center was a mechanical counter for the lab. The price was \$5. Many supplies were also purchased by lot, the administrator said.

Pioneer Memorial Hospital successfully bid on four of sixteen items. A stainless steel tray cart was purchased for \$157. New, Felt said, the cart would cost \$700-\$800. It is large enough to handle all the dinner trays on the upper level of the hospital, he added. The tray cart will keep the food warmer, and eliminate the need to cover all food items leaving the kitchen, he said.

The hospital also purchased a complete electrocardiogram machine, with supplies and attachments for \$226. The machine was purchased new six years ago, he said, for \$1,400. A stainless steel water heating unit was also purchased for \$26. The unit will be used to warm lab specimens in a water solution. Also purchased was a fifteen cubic foot refrigerator. It will replace a smaller unit and will be used to store evening snacks for patients. The price of the unit was \$127. The total amount spent by the hospital on bids was \$536, and the total for the North Morrow Medical Clinic was \$868.

Many boxes of supply items were also purchased, according to Felt. These boxes

included new plastic bassinets, a nursery crib dome, disposable slippers and gloves, and laboratory glassware. Many other items were also purchased for a total cost of \$380 on non-bid items. Other purchases were also made.

previous to the bid closures, at a 50 percent discount, Felt reported. These were regular supply items that would be normally bought in the course of business, noted Felt.

The hospital will not need to request support from the Hospital Foundation for its purchases, as was previously thought, Felt reported.

Traffic convictions drop

Traffic convictions reported to the Oregon Motor Vehicles Division (DMV) dropped nearly 27 percent during the first two months of 1982, compared with those months a year ago, stated a news release from the Motor Vehicles Division of the Oregon Dept. of Transportation.

Fewer than 62,000 convictions were reported. Last year nearly 83,500 were tallied.

Convictions, suspensions and other types of entries related to driving under the influence of intoxicants (DUI) also were down for the two month period by about five and one-half percent.

Based on DMV figures, it appears that about three-

fourths of first DUI offenders are agreeing to be diverted to education or alcohol treatment programs rather than risk a DUI conviction.

More than 1,300 DUI diversion agreements were received by DMV during the first two months of the year, compared with about 380 first-time convictions, the news release said.

The diversion law took effect in November 1981. It allows a driver arrested for DUI to agree with the court to divert to the education or treatment program if the driver has no previous DUI convictions or diversions. The driver must pay a \$275 diversion fee. Although diversions go on a driver's record,

those who take that route do not have to file proof of future financial responsibility for three years as do drivers convicted of driving under the influence, and there is no mandatory license suspension, the release concluded.

E.O.S.C. to offer M.B.A. program

A master's degree in business administration may be offered at Eastern Oregon State College as early as September, said a spokesperson from E.O.S.C.

Eligibility for the program depends upon an applicant's under-graduate grade point average and score on the Graduate Management Admission Test (GMAT).

Interested applicants still needing to take the GMAT have until May 18 to register for the exam to be given June 23 in Boise, Idaho; Portland and Walla Walla, Wash., the spokesperson said.

The degree is expected to take two-to-three years to complete. Six hours of graduate credit will be offered each term with classes scheduled evenings and weekends to meet the needs of students working full time, the spokesperson said.
