DA's Report

Sergio Gutierrez, 21 of Irrigon, pleaded guilty Monday, April 19 in Morrow County Justice Court at Irrigon to Attempting to Elude a Police Officer, reported Ann Spicer, district attorney. He was sentenced to pay a \$24 fine, Spicer said.

Gutierrez was also tried in Irrigon Justice Court on Monday, April 26 for Second Degree Theft. The trial ended with a hung jury, a mistrial was declared and the trial has been rescheduled for June 1, Spicer said.

In other court action, Spicer reported: Carol Moen, 60 of Boardman, was found not guilty of Driving Under the Influence of Intoxicants in Irrigon Justice Court on April 27.

Keith Papineau, 23 of Heppner pleaded guilty to Resisting Arrest on Wednesday, April 28 in Heppner Justice Court. He was sentenced to a 30 day jail sentence - suspended, a \$325 fine, all but \$107 suspended, must make \$27.95 restitution to officer Doug Rathbun for watch repair and was placed on probation for one year. Another charge, alleged Disorderly Conduct, was dismissed, Spicer said.

William Lee Calvin, 32 of Heppner, was arraigned in Morrow County Court on Friday, April 30 for alleged Fourth Degree Assault. Calvin appeared but no plea was entered. The case was continued for one week.

Paul A. Carlson, 21 of Heppner, entered a plea of not guilty to a charge of Driving Under the Influence of Intoxicants in Morrow County District Court on Friday, April 30. He was arrested March 24.

Raymond V. Curmuff, 24 of Ione was sentenced in Morrow County Circuit Court on Friday, April 30 for Unauthorized Use of a Motor Vehicle. He was placed on probation for three years to the Oregon State Corrections Division, subject to standard conditions of probation plus the following extra conditions: 1. Must reimburse Morrow County \$600 for court appointed attorney fees. 2. Must make restitution of \$916.25 to Monte Crum of Heppner. 3. Must make \$4,483.75 restitution to American States Insurance Co., for which he is jointly and severally liable with his co-defendant.

He lived in Phoenix, Ariz., before coming to Mount Angel five years ago.

He was active with St. Vincent De Paul in Salem.

Survivors include his sons, Donald, Honolulu, HI, and Vern, Port Townsend, Wash.; daughter, Zoe Nasset, Milwaukie; brother, Floyd, Sioux Falls, S.D.; sisters, Ethel Barrows, Port Townsend, Elvira Flannigan, Bend, and Florence Merfeld, Vancouver, Wash.; 14 grandchildren, and 31 great-grandchildren.

Rosary was recited Friday, March 26 at the Mount Angel Towers chapel. Mass was celebrated on Saturday, March 27, in the chapel, with interment in Belcrest Memorial Park Cemetery, Salem.
