Bill introduced to Senate, House for Gorge Scenic Area

Legislation to establish a Columbia River Gorge Scenic Area was introduced simultaneously in the House and Senate recently by Oregon Congressmen Les AuCoin and Jim Weaver and Senators Bob Packwood and Mark Hatfield, stated a news release from Les AuCoin.

AuCoin said the bill is the "crucial first step toward protecting the natural and scenic resources of the Columbia River Gorge under a comprehensive plan for managing future growth and economic development."

"The strength of the bill we're introducing today is that

it establishes a partnership between a Regional Commission and the federal government to develop a comprehensive plan to preserve the Gorge, to perpetuate the existing economy and promote compatible economic development," AuCoin said.

"Today's action gets the ball rolling on what will be a difficult legislative process. I look forward to working with my colleagues and all interested parties in moving this bill along, identifying its strengths and its weaknesses, with a maximum of local participation," he concluded.

Heppner tracksters break records

Three school records were broken by the Heppner girl tracksters at the Pilot Rock invitational on Friday, April 23.

The records were all running events and were broken by four first year tracksters and one veteran.

Though they were record breaking times, ironically, not one scored a first place win. Jodi Padberg set the new record in the 3,000 meters with a time of 12:01.5, beating her personal best by :10.5 and earning a second place win. Third place in the 300 meter hurdles was won by Pam Orr with a time of :50.9. She beat

the old 1981 :53.0 record set by Margaret Kincaid. The girls' 1,600 meter relay team consisting of Janelle McElhany, Diane Garrett, Mary Kincaid and Pam Orr set a new record at 4:45.7 beating the 1981 record of 4:56.

According to Coach Conklin, the placings went as follows: Girls first place in the 400 meter relay was Janelle McElhany, Jodi Padberg, Mary Kincaid and Stephanie Payne with a time of :54.1. Stephanie Payne also placed in the 100 meters. Jodi Padberg placed second in the 1,500 meter run with a time of 5:30.2.

Other individual scores for the girls were Mary Kincaid taking third in the long jump

and a tie for third in the high jump, and Dianne Garrett, also tying in the high jump for sixth place.

The boys did a little better in the scoring department, having five people placing in different events (besides the 400 meter relay team of Sid Kennedy, Jeff Orr, Greg Orr and Archie Lucas that took fifth place). Wesley Marlatt and Greg Orr both got a fourth and fifth place in different events. Marlatt placed fourth in the discus with a personal best of 114' and fifth in the shot put, while Orr got fourth in the long jump and fifth in the high jump. Others who placed were Jeff Orr, with a third in the high jump; Sid Kennedy throwing 178'4" in the javelin

for second place, and Duane Garrett getting fourth in pole vaulting.

"I couldn't have been happier with the group," said Coach Conklin. "Even though there were seven other schools besides Heppner competing, (Joseph, Weston-McEwen, Umatilla, Helix, Ukiah, Stanfield, and Pilot Rock) they really proved themselves in the competition." Coach Conklin went on to state some problems that have been plaguing the Heppner Mustang tracksters. "A lot of the girls have injuries that have altered their full performance levels. If we could just recover, I'm sure that they would be placing much higher."

Lone track team brings home trophy

The Cardinal tracksters traveled to Condon for a Big Sky Invitational track meet on Saturday, May 1. The Cardinal boys came home with a first place trophy as they racked up 176 points. The Cardinal girls finished fifth with 26 points.

Denny Starr was a double winner for the Cardinal boys, as he broke school records in both the discus and javelin. Starr threw the discus 139'1" and had a toss of 163'7" in the javelin. Starr also placed fifth in the triple jump with a leap of 34'11" and sixth in the 300 meter run in 2:39.04.

Craig Hams was another double winner for the Cardinals, as he took the long jump with a jump of 19'7" and the

triple jump with a leap of 36'8". Hams also brought in a second in the 200 meter dash in 24.23 and a third in the 110 high hurdles in 19.37.

Jeff Hams ran away with a first place win in the 200 meters in a time of 23.78. Hams placed second in the long jump with a leap of 19'2", third in the 400 meter dash as he crossed the line in 54.53 and fifth in the intermediate hurdles in a time of 52.32.

Donnie Taylor recorded a first in the high hurdles in a time of 16.5, a personal best for Taylor. He also placed second in the pole vault with a vault of 9', third in the intermediate hurdles in a time of 45.83 and fifth in the high jump with a leap of 5'4".

Mike Douglas finished first in the 3,000 meter run in 10:33.89 and second in the 1,500

meter run with a time of 4:42.

Tim Patton recorded a personal best and a first place in the high jump with a leap of 6'. Patton also recorded a second in the 3,000 meter run in 11:40.16 and sixth in the 1,500 meter run in 4:58.

Howard Leavitt placed third in the long jump with a leap of 17'9", fourth in the triple jump with a leap of 38'13", sixth in the high jump with a leap of 5'4" and sixth in the 400 meters in 55.47.

Randy McCabe placed fourth in the high hurdles in a time of 20.78 and sixth in the intermediate hurdles in 52.57.

Jay Love recorded a personal best in the javelin as he threw 131'4" to place him fourth. Donnie Doherty placed sixth in the 100 meter dash in 14.03.

The 400 meter relay team of

Scott Barnett, Patton, Love and Doherty finished fourth in a diving finish, 54.23.

The 1,600 meter relay team of Barnett, Love, Doherty and Douglas finished fourth with a time of 4:42.

Margaret Doherty was a double winner for the Cardinal girls as she broke her own school record in the 200 meter dash in 26 flat. Doherty tied the school record in the 100 meter dash in 12.6 and placed second in the 400 meter dash with a time of 62.8.

Michelle LaRue placed sixth in the discus with a throw of 75'7".

Team scores for the boys were Lone 176, Arlington 119, Helix 105, Condon 59, Dufur 32, and Echo 18. Team scores for the girls were Helix 159, Arlington 82, Dufur 52, Echo 37, Lone 29 and Condon six.

Heppner tracksters win third in 4-way meet

Heppner tracksters competed Tuesday, April 20 in a four way meet at Wahtonka where both the boys' and girls' teams took third places overall.

Team scores for the boys were: Wahtonka-103, Umatilla-47, Heppner-43, and Dufur-32. High point scorer for the boys' team was Greg Orr with a total of 14 points, followed by Sid Kennedy with 12 points. High point scorer for the girls was Jodi Padberg with 14 points followed by Mary Kincaid with 13 points.

Jodi Padberg achieved two firsts, one in the 1,500 meters

and another in the 800. She was also on the 400 meter relay team with Janelle McElhany, Jodi Padberg, Mary Kincaid and Stephanie Payne that took second place.

Other places that were won by the girls' team include a second place in the high jump by 4'8". A third place win in the high jump division was taken by Dianne Garrett with a jump of 4'2". Lisa Wilson had two third places; one in the shot put with a heave of 26'8" and another in the 3,000 meters with a time of 13:33.77. Janelle McElhany placed fifth in the 100 meter hurdles and fourth place in the 300 meter hurdles. Anne

Murray and Camie Papineau both did well in their first track meet, with Murray getting a second place in the javelin with 86'2" and Papineau placing fourth in the 800 and the 200 meter runs.

For the boys' team, Greg Orr had the lead, winning second place in the broad jump with a leap of 16'9", a third place in the high jump at 5'2", and another third place in the triple jump, springing 34'6". Orr was also on the boys 400 meter relay team that took second place.

Other members of the relay team include Archie Lucas, Jeff Orr and Sid placed in other events. Jeff

Orr took second in the high jump at 5'6". Lucas ran the 100 in 12.92, scoring him a fourth place win in that event; and Sid Kennedy threw the javelin 121'1", earning a second place score. Wesley Marlatt placed in two events, winning third in the shot put with a throw of 35'1" and placing fourth in the discus. Duane Garrett pole vaulted 9'6" to win second place.

Coach Conklin said he felt "very pleased with everyone. It was a little windy but conditions were very good. Even though this was the first time many had competed on an asphalt track, they performed ably and with confidence."

TAX BASE PROPOSAL

PROPOSAL

Shall Morrow County School District change it's tax base from \$661,249 to \$6,336,277 for the fiscal year 1982-83?

EXPLANATION

The current base is approximately 1/8 of the required tax needed to fund the school district operating budget. Even with the permissible statutory increase of 6% the district could only operate a very short period of time. It is necessary to increase the tax base in order to make it serve as a realistic base.

This measure will levy no taxes, instead it will establish a new tax base. If the measure is approved, the school district could not levy a tax in excess of the constitutional limit on this base unless the levy is authorized by a vote of the people residing in the district.
