STATE MEASURES

1 USE OF STATE BOND PROCEEDS TO FINANCE MUNICIPAL WATER PROJECTS
QUESTION: Shall the State lend funds it may now borrow to towns and communities for building water projects for municipal use? YES
PURPOSE: Amends state constitution. The law now permits the state to borrow in an amount up to one and one-half percent of the true cash value of all property in the state to fund secured loans for building irrigation and drainage projects. Measure would permit up to half of these funds to be lent to towns and communities of less than thirty thousand persons to pay for the building of water projects for municipal use. NO

2 MULTIFAMILY HOUSING FOR ELDERLY AND DISABLED PERSONS
QUESTION: Shall loans be made under elderly housing bond program for housing for disabled persons? Shall low income restriction be repealed? YES
PURPOSE: Amends state constitution. At the present time, the state may sell bonds to make loans to finance multifamily housing for low income elderly persons. The measure repeals the low income restriction. This measure also allows loans for multifamily housing for disabled persons. It also permits state loans to elderly persons to buy ownership interest in single units in multifamily housing. It does not increase the bonding authority of the state. NO

3 STATE BONDS FOR FUND TO FINANCE CORRECTIONS FACILITIES
QUESTION: Shall state sell general obligation bonds for fund to finance state, regional, county or city corrections facilities? YES
PURPOSE: Constitutional amendment would permit state to sell bonds for fund to finance acquisition, construction, equipping or improvement of state, regional, county or city corrections facilities. Bond issuance not to exceed \$60 million. Requires legislature to provide for payment of bonds.
ESTIMATE OF FINANCIAL EFFECT: This proposed amendment authorizes the issuance of general obligation bonds in an amount not to exceed \$60 million for the purpose of creating the Corrections Building Fund. The principal and interest for these bonds will be repaid from the state general fund. NO

4 RAISES TAXES ON COMMERCIAL VEHICLES, MOTOR VEHICLES FUELS FOR ROADS
QUESTION: Shall truck and other commercial vehicle taxes and motor vehicle fuel taxes be raised for road repair, improvement and construction? YES
PURPOSE: The measure would raise commercial vehicle highway taxes an average of 12.5 percent this July 1, 11.1 percent on July 1, 1983, and 10 percent on July 1, 1984. The state tax on gas and other motor vehicle fuels is now 8 cents per gallon. Use of these funds is limited by the Oregon Constitution to road repair, improvement and construction.
ESTIMATE OF FINANCIAL EFFECT: This measure will increase revenue to the Highway Fund by \$20.6 million in fiscal year 1982-83; \$42.3 million in fiscal year 1983-84; \$65.2 million in fiscal year 1984-85. Distribution of this revenue will be made as follows: 67.76 percent state government; 20.07 percent county governments; 12.17 percent city governments. NO

5 GOVERNOR TO APPOINT CHIEF JUSTICE OF OREGON SUPREME COURT
QUESTION: Shall Chief Justice of Oregon Supreme Court be appointed by Governor, instead of by judges of court? YES
PURPOSE: This measure proposes that Oregon Supreme Court judge who is also Chief Justice be appointed as such by the Governor, instead of by judges of the court. The Governor shall try to appoint a judge qualified to be administrative head of judicial department of government. The Governor must seek advice of judges of the court in making an appointment. A Chief Justice could be removed by judges of the court, but not by Governor. NO

COUNTY MEASURES

6 MORROW COUNTY TAX BASE MEASURE
QUESTION: Shall Morrow County increase the County Tax Base to \$3,238,773 for fiscal year 1982-1983? YES
PURPOSE: The purpose of this measure is to provide Morrow County with a realistic tax base which will balance the operating budgets for Morrow County, Pioneer Memorial Hospital and the North Morrow Clinic. The current (1981-1982) tax base is \$390,069, which is approximately 12% of the amount required to maintain efficient operation of county services. This base is not a levy, but provides a maximum amount that may be levied without a special tax levy election. The total amount of the tax base is eligible for partial state funding. NO

7 MORROW COUNTY SCHOOL DISTRICT TAX BASE PROPOSAL
QUESTION: Shall Morrow County School District change its tax base from \$661,249 to \$6,336,277 for the fiscal year 1982-1983? YES
PURPOSE: The current base is approximately 1/8 of the required tax needed to fund the school district operating budget. Even with the permissible statutory increase of 6%, the district could only operate a very short period of time. It is necessary to increase the tax base in order to make it serve as a realistic base. This measure will levy no taxes, instead it will establish a new tax base. If the measure is approved, the school district could not levy a tax in excess of the constitutional limit on this base unless the levy is authorized by a vote of the people residing in the district. NO
