

Carlsons attend meetings in Kansas City, Washington D.C.

Louis and Betty Carlson of Ione, recently returned from a trip to Kansas City, Mo. and Washington, D.C. Mr. Carlson is president of the Oregon Wheat Growers League and Mrs. Carlson chairperson of the Consumer Programs Sub-Committee. It was announced in a O.W.G.L. bulletin.

According to the bulletin, Mrs. Carlson reported that the USDA Extension Advisory Committee meeting in Kansas

City mainly covered programs that would provide information on farm management projects on farming business. Educational needs in the area of financial management as well as marketing management were also discussed, she said. The meeting also covered bankruptcy and how to avoid it, she said. Stress management is also needed for farmers and should

be faced in an educational program, she reported.

On May 17, the Carlsons attended the USDA meeting, Agriculture in the Classroom, held in Washington, D.C.

The purpose of the meeting was to get up educational materials and programs telling the story of agriculture in schools, the bulletin stated. Regional meetings across the U.S. are being scheduled, one in Portland, tentatively for July 6.

The Carlsons outlined the need for research on TCK smut elimination; the value of the STEEP erosion program; the value of U.S. AID research funding at the OSU Oregon-Mexico facility; and the value of early announcement of the 1983 farm provisions, according to the bulletin.

After returning to Ione, Louis Carlson traveled to Salem to appear before the Oregon Legislature Business Recovery Task Force. The force heard all segments of Oregon's economy relating to the economic slowdown and Carlson was asked to present the farmer's view. He testified that farmers must have relief from excessive costs placed upon them by governmental bodies, such as waterway users fees. He also said that land use planning must be kept with agriculture in mind, but, basically, that farming depends on export markets and how farmers sell their products.

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Plans are underway for annual 4-H camp

Morrow Co. Extension Service With school ending, 4-H'ers in fourth through seventh grades will be looking forward to the annual 4-H Camp. Plans are underway for the event, scheduled June 28 - July 1 at Cutsforth Park.

Counselors have attended training and the cooks have planned the menus. Staff are on standby and ready to provide a learning, fun experience for campers from Morrow, Gilliam, and Wheeler counties.

Extension staff in charge of the camp are Rich Bottoms, Gilliam County; Elva Madden, Wheeler County; and Birdine Tullis, Morrow Co. Directors working with the staff are Erin Evans, Keith Beamer, Todd Harrison and Carol West. Camp cooks are Franice Evans, Barb Mathis and Jan Evans. Jan Evans will also serve as arts and crafts resource person. Eunice McEliggett, registered nurse, will attend camp daily to check the health of the campers. High school age counselors from the three counties will each have a tent family of five or

six campers. Educational natural science classes, hikes, recreation, arts and crafts, as well as time for all to enjoy a leisurely outdoor experience, are included in the schedule. Volunteer instructors will be in charge of classes. One special class activity is reserved as a surprise for all attending the camp.

All enrolled members in fourth through seventh grades will receive application forms in the mail. Reservations to attend will be on first come basis. An early return will ensure a place at camp. Since the event is combining three counties, and space at camp is limited to the number of tents, there may be more would-be campers than can be accommodated this year. All camp registrations must be turned in at the Morrow Co. extension office by June 15.

A special word of caution to all Morrow 4-H members. The application form was devised to be sent to members in all three counties. The form is signed by Ken Killingsworth of Wheeler County but it applies to campers here as well as in the other two counties.

4-H exchange plans are being finalized

Morrow Co. Extension Agent Plans for an annual 4-H exchange between four Oregon club members and four Canadian club members are being finalized. It is hoped that one high school age boy or girl from each of Morrow, Wheeler, Gilliam and Sherman counties will be able to go to the Fraser Valley in British Columbia as part of the delegation, said John P. Nordheim, Morrow County Extension Agent. "We will also need one host home in each county to take one of the Canadian exchanges," he said.

The Oregon delegation to Canada will leave early on Monday, August 2 and will return Monday, August 9. Ken Killingsworth will take the group at no cost to the club members as he is judging at the Surrey County Fair on

August 6, 7, and 8, said Nordheim.

The Canadian exchanges will arrive on Monday, August 30. Ken Killingsworth will meet them and make arrangements to get them to their host counties. They will be picked up on Saturday morning, September 4, and Killingsworth will take them to the Oregon State Fair prior to their return to Canada.

Any high school age 4-H member that wishes to go to Canada should contact their County Extension Office by June 20 as each county will select their own representative. Also, any family that would be willing to host a Canadian 4-H Club member should also contact their local Extension Office, said Nordheim.
