Lee H. Pettyjohn, 63, a former Heppner resident, died in Portland on May 29, 1982.

He was born February 14, 1919 in Heppner, the son of Noah and Ella Pettyjohn. On May 6, 1945 he married Patricia Emerit of Hermiston in Pendleton. Mr. Pettyjohn was a lifelong wheat and cattle rancher in Gilliam and Morrow counties. He served in the U.S. Marine Corps as a platoon sergeant in World War II in the South Pacific.

Services were held Thursday, June 3 at Burns Mortuary Chapel, Pendleton, with burial at Olney Cemetery, Pendleton.

He was preceded in death by a son, Jerry Wayne Pettyjohn.
