New wheat variety to be released

A limited amount of Hill 81 (OR 68007) Foundation seed will be available to growers of certified seed in Morrow County for fall planting. A preliminary estimate indicates that 319 bushels will be available for planting in Morrow County. Actual allocations will be made after harvest this summer. Foundation Hill 81 will be sold by the Foundation Seed Project, OSU, for 30 cents per pound.

Foundation seed will be allocated to growers who will follow through with the certification process. Seed growers should be willing to sell half or more of the resulting production to other grain growers or dealers. The Extension agent will make the allocation of seed within the county. If more seed is requested than is available, a committee of

local wheat farmers will determine how the seed will be allocated.

Those who wish to obtain Foundation Hill 81 must submit a "Request for Foundation Seed" form to the Morrow County Extension office in Heppner by July 1.

Hill 81 is a soft-winter common winter wheat variety. The main advantage of Hill 81 for the dryland area of Central Eastern Oregon is its winter hardiness - it is more winter hardy than Stephens and nearly as winter hardy as Daws. The yield on dryland of Hill 81 in our area has generally been slightly lower than Stephens. Hill 81 may have some yield advantage over Stephens under irrigation. Hill 81 has a different source of stripe rust resistance than Stephens and could lessen the impact of a major epidemic if Stephens broke down to this disease.

Oregon Shakespearean Festival tour slated

Ashland III, Eastern Oregon Regional Arts Council's third annual bus tour to the Oregon Shakespearean Festival will provide a pre-Fourth of July holiday for 38 Eastern Oregon theater-goers, according to a release from the council.

The trip, scheduled for June 29 through July 2 includes an overnight stay in Bend, complete with an evening of French dining, the news release stated. Participants will stay at the conference facilities of Southern Oregon State College while in Ashland. Ashland III plays include two favorite, "Romeo and Juliet" and "Comedy of Errors," each performed in the open air Elizabethan Theater. "Spoken Word," the third play on the tour agenda, is playing in the 600 seat Angus Bowmer Theater.

This year's tour package includes round trip chartered bus transportation from La Grande and Pendleton, dinner and lodging at Bend, meals and lodging in Ashland and tickets to the plays, the news release said. Members of the regional arts council can join the tour for \$290. Non-member price is \$235 which includes a membership in the council. There is a \$35 single room supplement. Children's Ser. Div. seeks bids

The State Children's Services Division (CSD) is accepting bids from non-profit organizations for providing services to domestic violence victims in most areas from around the state, including Morrow County, according to Bill Christianson, manager, Children's Services Division Domestic Violence Program. Other counties include Hood River, Wasco, Sherman, Gilliam, Jefferson, Wheeler, Grant, Deschutes, Crook and Harney.

Funding for this program comes from a marriage license fee increase approved by the 1981 Oregon Legislature. The purpose of the program is to reduce and help prevent domestic violence within Oregon families, by contracting for emergency shelter care, crisis intervention and telephone hot-lines as well as other related social services," Christianson added. "After several months of planning and consultation with a Citizen Advisory Committee on Domestic Violence, we are ready to get the ball rolling with organizations who are able to deliver services to victims."
