Senate Minority Leader Bob Smith recently predicted in his weekly newspaper column that Oregon taxpayers will be "required to suffer through ... a long and costly special session of the state legislature." I am so sorry to disappoint Bob, but our bipartisan approach to balancing the budget seems to have worked quite well.

As senate majority leader, I had the impression that the budget balancing package was primarily initiated by Governor Atiyeh. Bob says the plan came from "liberals." Since liberals make up a minority of both the house and the senate, it is impossible for them to dominate either body.

Bob said he had a budget balancing plan too, but no one would listen to him. Maybe that says something about his leadership. Actually, I was unaware that he had a plan

until after the special session. Evidently, he sent his plan to the press but forgot to inform his fellow legislators.

After the special session, I had an opportunity to read his plan as reported in the press. It sounds like another one of those "give-away programs" that got us in the mess we're in today.

I prefer the program and salary cuts we made to balance the budget in the one-day special session and evidently the vast majority of legislators and the governor do also.

With Bob's talent and experience, he could be an important force in the Oregon Legislature as he once was; but now he would rather sit on the sidelines and criticize those who are making the decisions.

DA's Report

Raymond Eugene Weaver, 49 of Ione, was found guilty by jury in Morrow County Circuit Court June 23 of Driving While Revoked, Attempting to Elude a Police Officer and Driving Under the Influence of Intoxicants, reported Morrow County District Attorney Ann Spicer. Sentencing will be in about six weeks, she added.

Spicer also reported that David Joe Steelman, 30, Boardman, was arraigned on a charge of alleged First Degree Theft in Morrow County Circuit Court on June 23. Valerie Doherty was appointed as council for him.

Jeffrey Patrick Cutsforth, 22 of Lexington, was found guilty of Exceeding the Maximum Speed Limit in Morrow County District Court on June 25, reported Morrow County Deputy District Attorney Harold McLean. Cutsforth was fined \$107 for that charge. A charge of Attempting to Elude a Police Officer was withdrawn from the jury by the judge's order is the equivalent of a judgement of acquittal by the court, said McLean.

Rocky Lee Fritchman, 19 of Boardman, was tried for Second Degree Theft By Receiving in Morrow County Justice Court (Irrigon) on June 27 and was found not guilty. Fritchman pleaded guilty to a charge of having an Open Container of Alcohol in a Motor Vehicle. McLean said.

A case against Woodrow Catrom, 29 of Mosier for alleged Driving Under the Influence of Intoxicants was dismissed June 14 due to the failure of the arresting officer to appear at the trial, McLean said.
