The recipe for the cake contest has already been tried by many of the county's best cooks! There is still time for anyone 18 years of age or over, living in Morrow county to stir it up ... and get it to the fair. The annual Wheat Grower's League cake contest is one of the most anticipated activities at fair. There's always a crowd hanging around waiting for the news of the winners.

There is no need to pre-register ... just bake the cake following instructions in the premium book. Bring it to the open class foods area at the fairgrounds and enter it Sunday by 8:00 p.m. Judging will be early Monday morning.

First place winner will receive \$10; second \$5; and third \$3. The winner also receives a paid trip to the bake off at the Oregon Wheat Growers Convention, and the opportunity to win \$100 cash.

The fluffy white frosting recipe included with the recipe is a perfect topping for the tasty cake, and must be used on the fair entry. A handy hint regarding the frosting ... Be sure the milk and flour mixture which are cooked together are totally cold before adding it to the remainder of the ingredients. Recipe says "cool", but you'll have better results if it is

completely cooled.

Betty Carlson, state OWGL consumers program chairman, tells us that she bakes this cake frequently for family, and other good cooks confirm it has been one of their favorites for many years. Betty encourages all women and men to give it a try ... and bring it to the fair!
