Petitioner shall be awarded the family residence at 4th Street West and Washington, Irrigon, Oregon and shall assume the debt thereon.

IX
Each party should pay the debts incurred by that party since their separation which was on or about July, 1982 and hold the other party harmless therefrom.

X
Each party should pay his or her own attorney fees and costs incurred herein.

XI
The minor children of the parties reside at petitioner's address stated above and during the past four years have lived only with the parties in Oregon. Petitioner knows of no other past or present custody litigation concerning said children and has not participated in any capacity in any such litigation and knows of no person not a party who has or claims custody or visitation rights with respect to said children.

GEODC begins membership drive

GEODC (the Greater Eastern Oregon Development Corporation) has announced that August 9 marked the official start of its membership drive in the Morrow, Gilliam, Grant, Umatilla, and Wheeler counties.

GEODC has an open membership that encourages representation from groups or individuals that are interested in assisting in the growth and expansion of small business, said a corporation spokesperson.

The present members that have organized GEODC represent banks, savings and loan institutions, port districts, Chambers of Commerce, private businesses, local development corporations, local governments, utilities, and private individuals throughout the five counties. Some 35 members have already joined GEODC. There are no limits on the total

number of members GEODC hopes to receive, the spokesperson said.

To become a voting member of GEODC, it is necessary to 1) fill out an application and 2) purchase a membership certificate for a cost of \$100 per certificate. An individual, group, business or institution may purchase one or more of the certificates. The block(s) of certificates purchased will entitle the organization or individual to one vote in the business of GEODC, the spokesperson explained.

The overall goal of GEODC is to raise \$50,000 from the sale of the certificates. These proceeds will defray operating expenses of the corporation and provide seed capital to GEODC for the local injection requirement of being a Certified Development Company under the Small Business Administration. The local injection is a requirement by SBA

that GEODC provide 10 percent of the financing of a project. This 10 percent could be a loan from the capital raised, or equity, he said.

Each of the five counties has organized a group of local members to solicit new members, answer questions and disperse applications and information on GEODC. USDA vets find wild pigs are susceptible to African swine fever

Wild pigs caught in Florida were brought to a Long Island, N.Y. laboratory, inoculated with African Swine Fever virus, and found to be extremely susceptible to the disease, said Dr. John W. McVicar, a veterinarian with the U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA's) Plum Island Animal Disease Center.

African Swine Fever is a deadly disease of pigs which recently spread to Cuba, Haiti and the Dominican Republic. Scientists at Plum Island exposed the wild pigs to strains of the virus from Portugal and the Dominican Republic. All of the pigs died.

"The susceptibility of these pigs is of great concern to us," said Dr. McVicar. "If they should be accidentally infected with African Swine Fever, they could serve as a source of infection for our domestic pigs."

Dr. McVicar presented his research data before the annual meeting of the American Veterinary Medical Association held recently in Washington, D.C. All of the research was carried out at the Plum Island center, located about 1 1/2 miles off the coast of Long Island, N.Y.

This isolated laboratory is the USDA's center for the study of foreign animal diseases which pose a potential threat to our domestic livestock. The research was conducted in cooperation with scientists from the School of Veterinary Medicine, University of Florida, Gainesville.

Until three years ago, African Swine Fever had been largely confined to Africa and the Iberian peninsula, but it has since spread to Malta, Sardinia, Brazil, the Dominican Republic and Haiti. Early last year, the disease was diagnosed in Cuba where it is thought to have been introduced by illegal Haitian immigrants.

highly contagious viral disease of pigs. (Humans are not affected.) Swine with acute African Swine Fever normally die four to seven days after the onset of fever, and some may die before symptoms appear.

The form of African Swine Fever in the western hemisphere, however, differs from the acute and highly fatal form. Mortality from the western hemisphere isolates can range from nearly none to occasionally 50 percent. Pigs that survive will appear normal but they and many meat products produced from them will be infectious for other pigs.

"African Swine Fever poses a threat because of the United States' close proximity to countries where the disease is present," said Dr. McVicar. "Contaminated pork products brought in by the recent influx of Cuban and Haitian refugees could also pose a problem. In addition, Caribbean fishermen sometimes carry pigs and pork products on their boats, a situation that could lead to exposure of the disease to wild pigs in Florida."

"In Florida, wild pigs are natural scavengers known to in-

habit all but one of Florida's 67 counties. The pigs are hunted extensively and trimmings from the carcasses are sometimes fed to domestic pigs. Wild pigs are also captured and sold as feeder pigs; if infected, these pigs could set the stage for wide dissemination of African Swine Fever and a potential disaster in the U.S. pork industry," Dr. McVicar said.

During their studies at Plum Island, the scientists examined the carcasses of wild pigs that died from African Swine Fever and found that some of the lesions and hemorrhages in the carcasses resembled those caused by other diseases.

"Some of the lesions we found were caused by heavy infections of lungworms and kidney worms. Extensive bleeding within the tissues may suggest that the animal died of severe hemorrhage caused by trauma, heavy parasite infection or even poisoning, rather than African Swine Fever," said Dr. McVicar. "A misdiagnosis could allow African Swine Fever to spread undetected."

Plum Island is a facility of USDA's Science and Education Administration.
