Following the last regular session of the Oregon Legislature, the Oregon Farm Bureau Federation published an analysis of the voting record of each legislator based on eight issues considered most critical to Oregon agriculture. Agriculture is today the

number one industry in Oregon. It would be catastrophic, not just to farmers, but to all Oregonians to have in the office of governor, a person who not only does not support agriculture, but who is openly hostile to everything which farmers need to survive. Jerry Brown has demonstrated how destructive an anti-agriculture governor can be to a state. We cannot afford one in Oregon.
