

56 participate in Lions Club Men's Golf Tournament

Fifty-six men participated in a Heppner Lions Club Men's Tournament at Willow Creek Country Club last Sunday. This year's turnout was the largest the annual event has seen, said George Koffler of the Lions Club.

Golfers played a qualifying round and only nine of 18 holes because of the rainstorm.

Champion of the tournament was Treve Gray of Pendleton with a low score of 28 for nine holes, two under par.

Winners of the first flight were Paul Stringer, first place with a 29, John Edmundson second, both of Heppner; Larry Monkus of Pendleton, third place; Oscar Shoemaker, Boardman, fourth place; and Charlie Starks of Heppner and Ron Gray of Pendleton tied for fifth and sixth places.

George Waterland of Heppner won K.P. in the first flight on number two, while

long drive was won by Treve Gray.

Doug Smith took first place in the second flight with a 34, Ray Massey placed second, third place winner was Bob Jepsen, Ed Hiemstra won fourth, Earl Fishburn, fifth, and Clint McQuarrie, Ed Gunderson and Elmer Palmer were in a three-way tie for sixth place. All winners in the second flight are Heppner residents.

Clint McQuarrie took K.P. on number three and long drive was won by Bob Jepsen.

In the third flight, Cliff Green, Heppner, won first place with a score of 33; Doug Sticka of The Dalles took second; John Shaw, Heppner, placed third; fourth place was won by Jerry Daggett, Heppner; Gerald Pierson and Howard Burnside, both of Heppner, tied for fifth place; and Pete Clark of Pendleton

took sixth.

Special awards were given to Paul Stringer for K.P. second shot, on number one; Cliff Green on number five; and Charlie Starks, K.P. on number seven. Starks also had long putt on number eight.

The most impressive feats were performed by Ray Michael of Boardman and Terry Nelson of The Dalles.

Gray, the champion, and the winners of the first three places in each flight were awarded plaques from the Lions Club, which were purchased from Peterson's Jewelers, Heppner, at a discounted price. Other winners were presented golf ball for their efforts.

Proceeds of the tournament, \$150 each, will go the Oregon Lions Sight and Hearing Foundation and to the Heppner Swimming Pool solar heating project.

However, Starr found sophomore back Mark Meyers in the early part of the fourth quarter for an 18-yard screen pass to put the Cards up 42-6.

Powder Valley scored twice in the fourth quarter to round out the final 42-18 tally.

"For the first game I was pleased with so few penalties," Myers said. "There were not a lot of mistakes. I don't know if it's because the kids are a year older, or because we prepared them better."

The Ione kicking game helped out in the game also, with Craig Gutierrez getting off punts of 56 and 47 yards for a 51 average. The long

punts put the Badgers in the hole both times.

One of Ione's running backs Howard Leavitt, bruised his thigh in the second quarter, and it has not been decided if he will be healthy to play this Friday against Condon.

The Cards travel to Condon for the 7:30 p.m. contest, and Coach Meyers says he plans to have the offense do about the same thing, mixing passes and running.

"We ran 30 rushing plays and threw 25 passes against Powder, and we plan to do about the same thing Friday," he said.
