

Office building going up at county shop site

A modular building was being set up at the new county shop site in Lexington Tuesday. The building will house the Public Works Department office and possibly the county planner's and surveyor's offices, said Don Briggs, director of the Public Works Department. Presently, the Public Works Department office is located in the Giliam and Bisbee building on Main St. in Heppner.

The structure which has room for about five offices and a large conference room for county meetings, was obtained through federal surplus for hauling costs only, from Idaho Falls, Idaho, said Briggs.

The county has had the building for about two years and has been waiting to erect it until the county shop was



relocated, he said. Personnel of the Public Works Department

will move into the new office in six to eight weeks.

Under committee reports, Harold Peck told of his museum and log cabin at the fairgrounds in Heppner, and of some of the recent work done on the museum. He spoke some of the articles he had on display, which include sewing machines, washing machines, small tools and many other

articles, and some Heppner annuals from the Blahm family, former Heppner students. Barton Clark told of the farms that are now century farms in our country and as soon as they can be qualified there will be a recognition party. This takes some time he reports, as deeds and homestead rights must be researched. A report on the "Morrow County Chronicles," a recently published book, which was sponsored by the society, was given by Helen Currin. The committee responsible for this fine publication are Lucile Peck, Justine Weatherford, Helen Currin, Inez Erwin, Frances Mitchell and Lorraine Griffith. The books are available from some of the members and also at the Bank of Eastern Oregon in Ione, Bristows Market, and the Bank of Eastern Oregon in Heppner. This book will be published yearly and the committee is again looking forward to much material furnished by the people. The group known as the Good News Singers enter-

tained with several fine numbers. The group consists of the family of Norman Eppanbaugh and others who really enjoy singing and playing sacred songs. They also sang "Amazing Grace" for member Rob Lowe.

Under new business, the book to be printed on Morrow County was discussed by Jean Nelson and it is hoped that there will be enough interest shown that the society can go ahead with printing. Letters will soon be coming to all county residents and those interested in contributing to the book are asked to reply soon so that work can be started as it must be finished by February in order to get the 1982 printing rates.

The nominating committee gave the following nominations for directors: Barbara

Bloodsworth, Barton Clark, Harold Beckett and Jim Hayes. As there were no further nominations from the floor they were elected by acclamation.

Reports were given on the trip to Burns, and a trip to Astoria is planned for the first weekend in May which will be a Friday and Saturday overnight stay.

Delpha Jones, president of the society, accepted an oil painting for the group of the Morrow County Courthouse from Sylvia McDaniel, a Heppner artist. Mrs. McDaniel, who worked in the building for 27 and one half years as county treasurer, gave the painting to the society as a gift. The society will display the gift inside the courthouse building.
