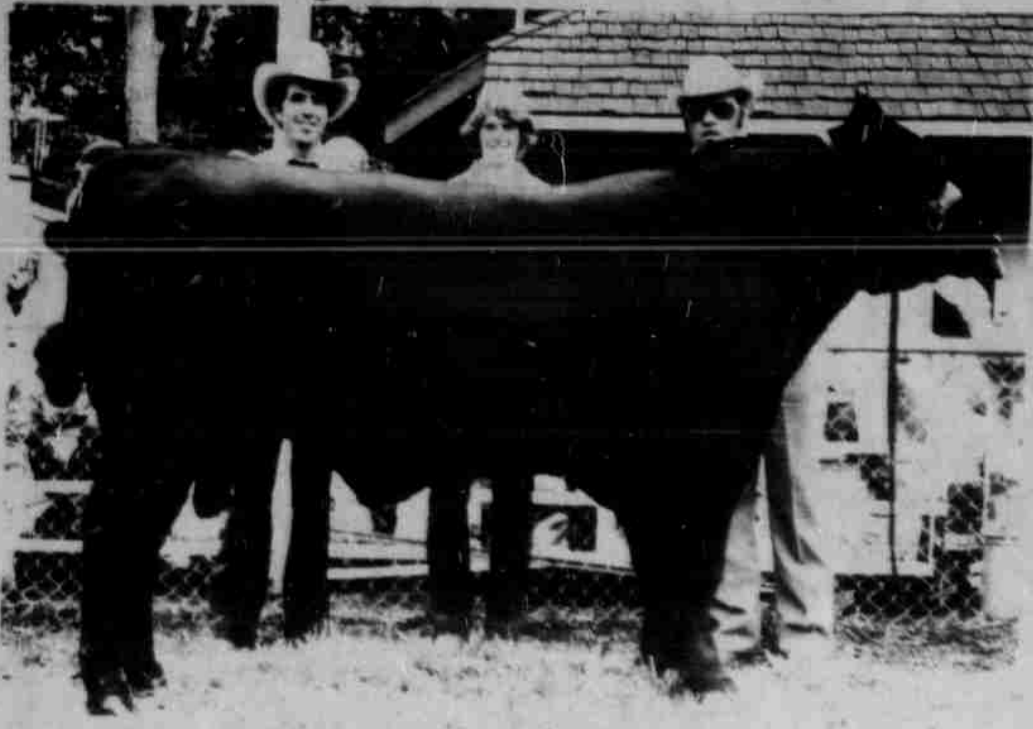

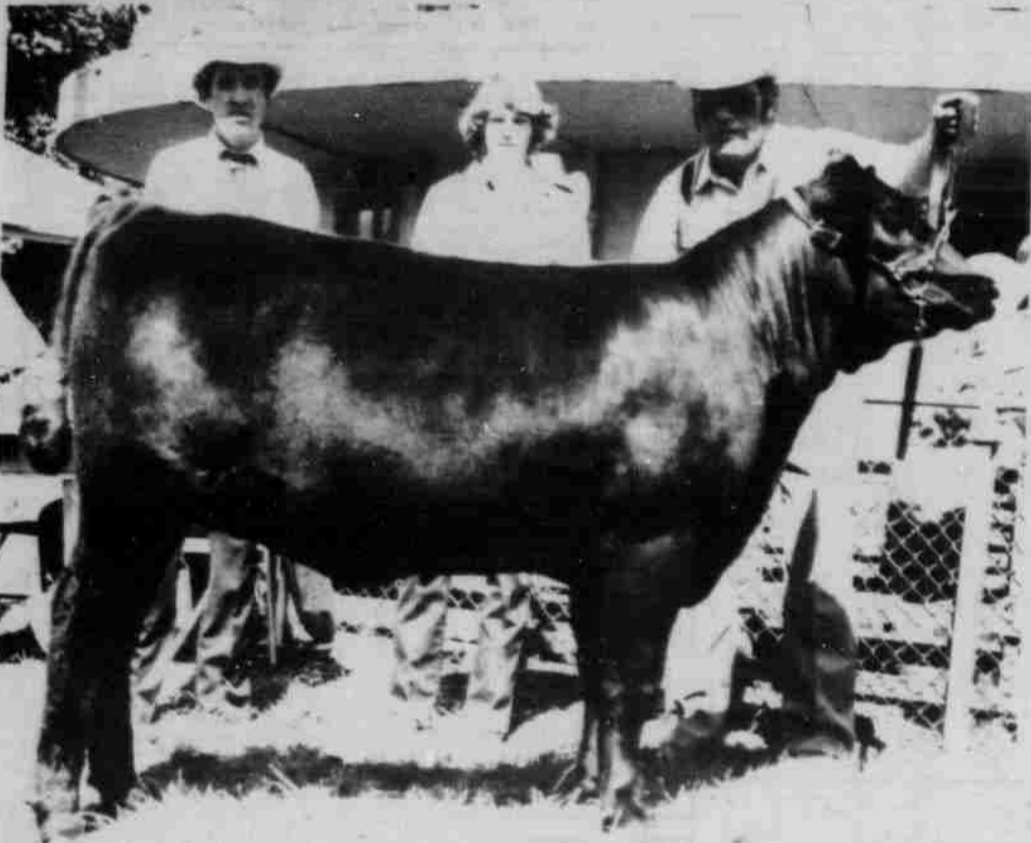

## Mustangs trample Huskies, 22-6

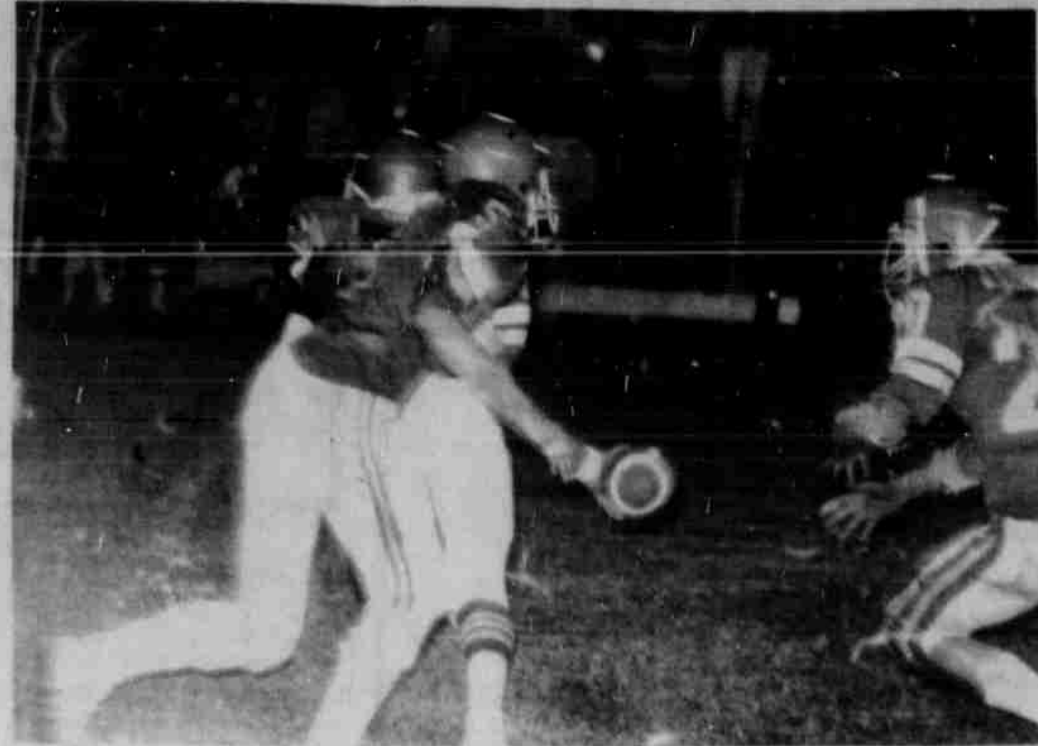

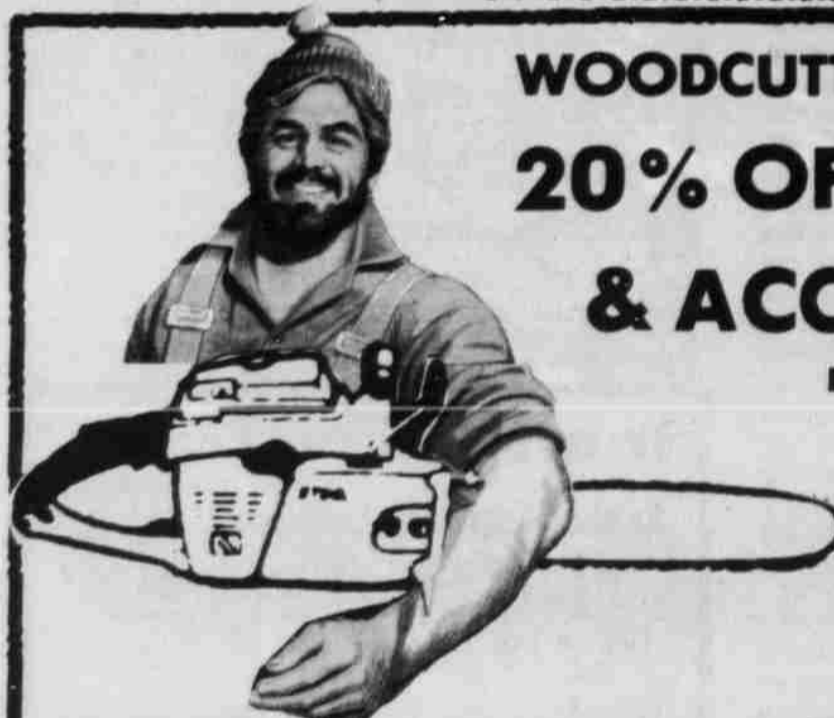
