Little River Band cancels EOOSC concert

The rock group Little River Band has cancelled its Eastern Oregon State College appearance, scheduled for November 6.

According to student activities director Yvonne Tagge, it will be impossible to reschedule the concert for another

concert this season.

Tagge said the group consented to include EOOSC on its tour as a stop between two larger colleges, but cancelled its commitment when members learned they would be traveling more than 400 miles

in one day.

"They have a limit of 400 miles they will travel between stops," Tagge said. "EOOSC would add about 150 miles to that limitation, but the group just wouldn't agree to travel the extra miles."
