

Ione Garden Club meets

"The Songs and Flight of Birds" was the subject for discussion at the Ione Garden Club meeting, led by Delta Huber, on Wednesday, Oct. 13. Ruth McCabe and Pat Pettyjohn were hostesses. Mrs. Huber stated that birds are very useful to the gardener because they help to control insects, act as a sanitation squad to clean up debris, and consume weed seeds, said a club spokesperson.

Plantings to attract birds may be made in one's garden. A thicket of raspberries, blackberries and elderberries may attract as many as 100 species of birds. Other shrubs that attract birds include dogwood, pokeberry, red

cedar, sumac, mulberry, holly, cotoneaster, Mt. Ash, juniper, Oregon grape, currants and gooseberries, said Mrs. Huber. Hummingbirds are especially fond of red hot poker, coral bells, trumpet vine, cut and come again and bee balm. Some of these are sold at the spring plant sale by garden club members.

Migration of birds provides an interesting activity for gardeners. They see many different birds as they migrate, especially in the spring and fall. The birds may travel by day or night and may cover as much as 22,000 miles more round-trip. Their speed varies from 17 to 250 miles per hour in flight, she

told the group.

In quoting from a current article from "Family Circle" magazine, Mrs. Huber noted that there are many diminishing species in our area. These include the chipping sparrow, towhee, flicker, wren, hairy woodpecker, yellow warbler, golden crown kinglet, barn owl and bludbird. Some of these birds have been seen during the Christmas bird count which is held annually by bird lovers in Morrow County.

Books that can give an amateur bird watcher help in identifying birds are Roger Tory Peterson's book "A Field Guide to Western Birds" and the "Golden Guide to Field Identification Birds of North America" by Robins, Bruun, Zim and Singer.

While refreshments were being served, a tape of different bird calls was played and members enjoyed hearing familiar songs of birds they recognized, the spokesperson concluded.

Deadline near for all-risk barley and wheat insurance

October 31 is the last date on which applications will be accepted in Morrow County for all-risk insurance policies on 1983-crop barley and wheat. All-Risk Crop Insurance District Director Andy Bak says that information about the coverage available, as well as a list of local agents who offer the insurance, can be obtained by contacting the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation office in Heppner.

Bak says that the number of applications received to date and the interest expressed by wheat growers suggests that the amount of insurance in force will be a record high. "One major reason," Bak notes, "is the continuing increase in crop production costs. Many wheat growers simply do not have the necessary cash reserves or additional borrowing capability to take a chance on losing the

money that they will have invested in their crops."

"Another reason," the insurance official contends, "is the reduced cost of purchasing insurance." The federal government, in an effort to encourage participation in the program, pays up to 30 percent of the cost of the protection. Anticipated sign-up also is expected to be higher because a growing number of lenders are requiring or suggesting that borrowers carry at least enough coverage to provide for repayment of production loans, he concluded.

Oregon students score well

Oregon high school juniors and seniors last year outscored their national contemporaries on all four tests administered by the American College Testing Program, according to Verne A. Duncan, state superintendent of schools.

Nearly 1,400 Oregon college-bound students were tested for their general educational development and ability to complete college-level work in English, math, social studies and natural science.

The Oregon average on all tests was 19.3, up from 19.2 in the previous year, while the national average dropped from 18.5 to 18.4, he said.

Following are Oregon scores on individual tests with national scores listed in parentheses: English 18.8 (17.9), math 17.5 (17.2), social studies 18.6 (17.3), natural science 21.8 (20.8).
