

'Books for Zimbabwe' project of I.U.C.C.

The Ione United Church of Christ is engaged in a project called "Books for Zimbabwe." This project has been design-

ed by the United Church Board for World Ministries of the United Church of Christ to develop libraries in the mission schools of Zimbabwe, Africa. Fred Martin, Ione, and the Rev. Cathy Barker, I.U.C.C. pastor, are corporate members of that board.

A recent 14-year war for independence in this South African country took a tremendous toll in property and lives as well as in educational and medical facilities. This project will help to provide educational materials for the more than 50 former mission schools to help them train students more effectively in reading skills. "Education is one of the best ways of helping people," Barker said. "Christian values can be

shared in this way and the students learn ways to help themselves," she continued.

Nationally, the United Church Board for World Ministries hopes to send 10,000 used books to Zimbabwe by September 1983 and to supply sets of encyclopedias and magazine subscriptions for each of the mission schools.

Ione school teachers have gathered five boxes of old textbooks for the project and church members have also contributed books. The United Church Women are helping to pay postage, and further donations are asked for that expense, Barker said.

The Jr. High Youth Fellowship has chosen to collect funds in "Trick-or-treat" fashion on Sunday, October 31,
