Wrap baked goods carefully before sending through mails

Baked goodies are a terrific present for someone miles away from home—a fruitcake or a selection of freshly baked cookie gems.

But, since they're to be mailed, there are certain precautions you should take.

Firstly, the best cookies for shipping are fairly moist but not fragile (ie, brownies, bar or drop cookies filled with fruit, pfeffermusse). Sticky frostings, nuts and chocolate trims should be avoided.

Choose containers that are sturdy, such as tins or cardboard boxes. Wrap baked goods in clear plastic, aluminum foil or waxed paper. Wrap individually, or in small groups, depending on fragility.

In any case, never wrap together different kinds of cookies. To pack, put cookies into container by layers, separating layers with a piece of cardboard.

Containers should be placed into sturdy boxes and padded. Packages should, of course, be tied securely, marked "perishable" and mailed as much in advance of Christmas as possible.

to avoid sitting in post offices—remember, the longer it remains in transit, the more likely it is that your baked goods will arrive at their destination stale.

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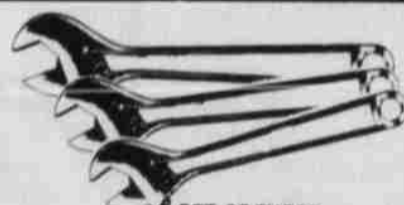
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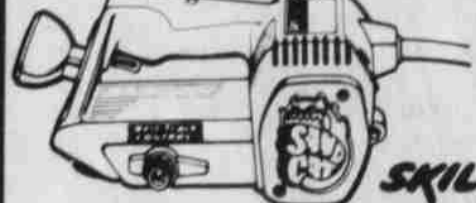
