'Tis the season to get ready

Does simply thinking about Christmas send you into a mild frenzy? Along with evoking pleasant visions of carolers, egg nog and happy family get-togethers, Christmas also means crowded stores, hectic shopping and last-minute preparations.

You can avoid the holiday rush by preparing for it ahead of time. Here are some suggestions to help you get ready for Christmas before it arrives:

- Put your Christmas card and gift list together in the fall to avoid any last minute rush. Starting early also allows you plenty of time to make your own creative greeting cards. All you need is some white or lightly colored blank note paper, a thin artist's brush and a bottle or box of household dye.

- Begin by lightly outlining an open-faced design onto the note cards—Christmas tree, star, heart, etc. Prepare a hot concentrated dye solution (dissolve 1/2 cup of liquid dye or one package powder dye in one pint of very hot water [steamy hot—not

simmering]), and dip brush into your favorite Rit color.

After removing any excess dye from the brush, paint the dye onto the paper with light strokes working from the edges toward the center of the open area. After your design dries, you can add details with colored pencils, india ink or paper appliques such as gold stars.

- Making your own colorful season's greetings is easy and economical, and adds a warm personal touch to the holiday. Also, remember to mail your cards early so they aren't delayed in the heavy holiday mail crush.

- Select your Christmas gifts early in the season. You can easily avoid the last-minute shopping rush by purchasing items as you see them throughout the year and storing them away until gift-giving time.

- Or, if the stores seem unbearable to you, why not make your own presents? With a little imagination, some inexpensive items and Rit Dye you can do creative things.

For instance, dye an unfinished wood picture frame and place your favorite photo in it to give to someone special; make a wall hanging by painting with dye on stretched canvas, or dye a natural colored wicker planter and place dried flowers in it to use as a centerpiece.

- When wrapping your Christmas gifts this season with colorful paper and bows, make them even more special by adding a personal touch.

- With a store bought alphabet stencil, household dye and an artist's brush, you can stencil your special friend's name on a gift tag. Just fill in the stencil with dye in the shade you like the best.

- Check your Christmas ornaments before the holiday arrives. Replace any that have broken; spruce up the ones you plan to use and check the strings of lights to be sure everything's in proper working order.

CHECKLIST FOR A PERFECT HOLIDAY SEASON

For the tree

- Look over ornaments. If any are broken, replace them early before selections narrow;
- Have a supply of ornament hangers to replace those left on last year's tree.
- Check lights and cords.
- Buy extra bulbs.
- Look over tree cloth to be sure it is clean and has no holes.
- Find tree stand and clean it up.

For gifting

- Make your list early and do a little at a time.
- Get wrapping paper, ribbons, cards.
- Wrap as you buy gifts.

For cards

- Select your cards early. If they are to be personalized, take the envelopes home now.
- Bring address book up to date; remember zip codes.
- Address envelopes during short sessions while watching television, listening to the radio or stereo.
- Get postage stamps, and remember special denominations for those going to foreign countries.

Tree-trimming with glee

Armed with a bowl of freshly-popped popcorn, and another of egg nog flavored with nutmeg, tree-trimmers will get to work, taking pride in their activity.

Whether the tree is natural or artificial, six feet tall or perhaps two feet, it engenders the same feeling of warmth and happiness that characterizes Christmas.

Ornaments range from strings of bright lights to garlands of popcorn and cranberries to family heirlooms handed down from generation to generation. Well-traveled people may

TIRED OF TURKEY? WHY NOT VARY HOLIDAY MENU?

Are you tired of turkey? We begin to look forward to the big bird somewhere around October when the fall harvest of pumpkins, squashes and cranberries titillates our taste buds as we anticipate Thanksgiving.

We shoot our bolt on that last Thursday in November with a table that should rightly be called a groaning board.

Then, with Christmas shopping, decorating, parties and all the other preparations for the season, we give little thought to a Christmas feast that could be a shade different.

Not only is it traditional to present the turkey with all its trimmings, it's easier.

But, really, a crown roast of pork or lamb, stuffed in the center with its own ground meat, nuts and cranberries and decorated with spiced apples on each point, is not difficult to fix.

A German sauerbraten marinated in ginger snaps, an English standing roast of beef accompanied by Yorkshire pudding, a French breast of veal stuffed with ground pork, rice and olives may require a little more time, but each is well worth the effort.

Recipes for all these treats are available in any good basic cookbook.

For those whose families would go into shock without the traditional turkey and trimmings, throw them a curve on appetizer or dessert.

Try an elegant, light cream of watercress soup (canned chicken broth, watercress put through a food processor and a dash of nutmeg), a molded pate of beef, pork and liver, or a quiche made with Edam cheese and sliced tomatoes.

And, for that last sweet course, dispense with the pie and turn your pumpkin into a cinnamon-perfumed brandied flan (custard) or stack miniature cream puffs into a pyramid held together and drizzled with caramel syrup.

take pride in the wide variety of countries represented on their tree, a veritable U.N. Food-lovers may opt to make their tree edible—hanging little chocolate balls and bells covered in bright-colored foil, and home-baked gingerbread cookies in a myriad of shapes.

Candy canes can be hung from the tree's branches by their crooks, or can be grouped in miniature Christmas stockings. Miniature stockings can also be used to hold small bottles of booze from the tree.

And, with edible ornaments, there's one further advantage—when it comes to taking down the tree, after Christmas, you can make a last party of it—eating what comes off the tree, with glee.
