

# Mustangs crushed by Wahtonka Eagles in overtime, 54-53

After an exciting win Friday over Umatilla, the Mustangs were crushed when Wahtonka succeeded in edging Heppner in overtime 54 - 53, Saturday, Jan. 26.

In the first half, the Mustangs played an excellent game, getting and maintaining a 12 point lead at the end of the second quarter.

"We played an excellent first half," Coach Brent Eggers stated, "But in the second half the poor execution of the offense hurt us. With a 12 point lead, you have to have patience."

Poor offensive execution is a recent problem that has cropped up to plague the cagers at a time when they least need it. With the loss to Wahtonka, their league hopes have become marginal. Right now the Mustangs are in a tie for third place with Umatilla. Weston-McEwen is in second place and Pilot Rock holds first.

"Our chances are getting slimmer," Eggers went on to say. "But a lot of things can happen."

The lack of consistency is still present in Heppner's resulting from "lack of concentration, which is not a good quality to maintain."

Coming up on the Mustang agenda is Wasco at Heppner on Friday night and Sherman Co. there on Saturday.

Eggers commented on the upcoming games "Wasco Co. is not one of the stronger teams we'll play but we have shown that we must play well to win. We are in no shape to be looking past anybody." He

went on to say "Sherman is a good ball club. They have one of the top players in the league, Tod Coles, who has been one of the top players for four years. Also, they are well coached. If we want to keep any hopes for going to district alive, we can't afford to lose any more," he said.
