Notice is hereby given that on Tuesday, May 17, 1983, an election will be held in Morrow County, Oregon. The polls will be open from 8:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. The following question shall be submitted to the qualified voters thereof:

### TAX LEVY OUTSIDE THE TAX BASE

SHALL MORROW COUNTY LEVY \$2,304,197 OUTSIDE THE TAX BASE FOR ALL COUNTY OPERATIONS DURING FISCAL YEAR 1983-84?

The purpose of this levy is to provide funds to balance the Morrow County operating budget which includes: General Fund, Roads, General School Fund, Cities portion of Road Funds, plus the Morrow County Hospital and Clinic budgets for 1983-84. The tax base for 1983-84 is \$438,281.

The total levy will be \$2,742,478. If this measure is approved, \$2,376,290 of the taxes levied in 1983-84 are eligible for partial State Funding. However, \$366,188 of the taxes levied will be totally financed by the local taxpayers. The tax rate for County operations will be approximately \$3.92 per \$1,000 valuation. This levy is \$189,802 less than the levy for 1982-1983. This legal notice is to be published in the Heppner Gazette-Times.

Upon the question of levying a tax for the purpose of funding the school district budget NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT an election will be held on May 17, 1983 between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 8:00 p.m. The purpose of the election is to submit a tax levy to the voters to fund the school district operating budget for the 1983-84 school year.

The purpose of the entire amount to be voted upon is to provide funds for maintenance and operation of the school district which cannot be provided within the district's tax base of \$700,923.00. The total levy will result in an estimated tax rate of \$7.13 per \$1,000.00 of true cash value, exclusive of the tax for bonded indebtedness.

LEXINGTON, OREGON

On May 24, 1983 at 7:30 p.m. there will be convened an open public hearing by the Morrow County Court of Morrow County on the following proposed Airport development as fully described and depicted in the Morrow County Airport, Draft Environmental Assessment, April, 1983.

Acquire from 20 to 30 acres of land immediately adjacent to the recently developed Runway 9-27 and acquisition of aviation easements for the approaches to these runways. Pave Runway 9-27, 4,355 feet by 75 feet and remark the existing Runway 8-26 on a parallel taxiway. This will include exit and holding taxiways.

Install medium intensity runway lights (MIRL) to Runway 9-27 including visual approach slope indicator (VASI) lights on each end.

Improve the existing apron and aircraft parking areas and to pave additional area.

Place of Meeting: The hearing will be held in the Morrow County Annex Building, Lexington, Oregon.

Purpose of Hearing: To consider the economic, social and environmental effects of the airport location and proposed development plan and its consistency with the goals and objectives of such urban planning as has been carried out for this area.

Conduct of the Meeting: Representatives of Morrow County will at the outset, present a summary of their views concerning the airport's and the proposed project's social, economic, and environmental impact, and their consistency with locally carried out urban planning. Other persons present and desiring to do so will then be afforded the opportunity to present written or oral views (whether in favor of, in opposition to, or by way of proposed revision of the proposed project).

All oral comments will be recorded.

Availability of Environmental Statement: Morrow County has retained the firms of Ted Soliday, Aviation Consultant and Krumbain Engineering, Ltd. to prepare a draft Environmental Assessment Report on the impact of the proposed development. This draft report is available to the public for examination and study during normal working hours for at least 30 days prior to the hearing at the following locations: The Morrow County Courthouse, Heppner, Oregon; The Morrow County Courthouse Annex Building, Irrigon, Oregon; and the Morrow County Annex Building, Lexington, Oregon.
