Ore. magazine features section on local areas

Northeast Central Oregon is described as "well-positioned for broad moves into new commercial and sectors" in a special section of the May issue of Oregon Business Magazine.

This special section assesses the economic development positions of Morrow, Umatilla, Grant, Wheeler and Gilliam counties. It is the seventh in a series of 14 regional economic profiles being published by the magazine in cooperation with the Oregon Department of Economic Development, said a magazine spokesperson.

The article notes, "clearly, agriculture is responsible for the development of this area and it will play a key role in its future. Because of the progress, agriculture has made and the trade channels it has opened, the region is well-positioned for broad moves in other commercial and industrial sectors. Major railroads, highway and river barge systems give the region easy access to the rest of the nation and to countries of the Pacific Rim."

The rapid development of circle irrigation systems, the processed potato industry and the development of ports in the region are traced by the magazine.

"There is a sense of bigness in Northeast Central Oregon. It comes from the vast, uncluttered openness of the land, the three-mile-wide Columbia River, but most of all it comes from the deeds of the people who live here — deeds like the construction of huge hydroelectric dams that throttle the forces of one of the world's greatest rivers, immense

farms that average in the thousands of acres each, sprinkler systems that cover more than a hundred acres in a single sweep, the actual transplanting of whole towns to new locations, and the successful transforming of arid deserts to fertile, super-producing farm lands."

The region's economy is described in the article as rooted in natural resource industries, but it also points to the considerable work being done in the five counties to attract new industries to the region. It describes the character and quantity of industrial land that is ready for immediate development.

The purpose of the economic profile series, according to Oregon Business Publisher Larry Walker, is to point out the positive things that are happening throughout Oregon in the area of economic development. In addition to the magazine's in-state circulation of nearly 20,000, the magazines containing the economic profiles are being mailed to an additional 5,000 growth companies throughout the United States as well as those in a number of countries in Europe and Asia.

Walker said, "Oregon has to live down its reputation of being anti-business and we believe the economic profiles to be a positive step in that direction. It is not only important that out-of-state businesses know what is happening in Oregon, but it is equally important that Oregonians know there are many positive things going on throughout the state to insure our continued growth and prosperity."

Hall finalist for FFA position

Dave Hall, vocational agriculture teacher at Wallowa High School, and the son of Gene and Harriet Hall of Heppner, has been chosen as one of three finalists for a newly created position on the National FFA Board of Directors, announced the National Vocational Agricultural Teachers Association.

The position is to be filled by a current classroom Vo-Ag teacher. Presently, the board consists of the National FFA student officers plus adults from the United States Office of Education. Because of a national rule change, the next adult opening on the board will be filled by an appointment

from the three Vo-Ag finalists, the association said.

Hall has been recommended to the position by a vote of delegates of the Vo-Ag teachers of the 10 western states after having been selected by the Vo-Ag teachers of Oregon. This selection came at a recent meeting of the Western States Region of the National Vocational Agriculture Teachers Association in Rio Rico, Arizona, which Hall attended.

Hall has been teaching at Wallows for eight years and has won many awards as a Vo-Ag teacher including the National Outstanding Young Teacher, National Career Exploration winner and Honorary State and American Farmer Degrees.

He was very active in the Heppner FFA Chapter while in high school and was a State Farmer, Star State Farmer finalist and a State Officer.
