Old Army map of Morrow Co. shows early settlements

(Editor's note: the above map of Morrow County was sent to the Gazette-Times from Judge John F. Kilkenny, Portland, a former county resident along with the following note: I thought you would be deeply interested in the enclosed map of Morrow County taken from ancient records of the Department of the Army. Strange how many communities have disappeared, such as Atwood, Saddle, Pettysville, Salingville, Midway and Dairyville. I suppose Sand Hollow earned its prominence by reason of being the battleground or first

encounter between the Cayuse Indians and Colonel Gilliam's column during the Cayuse War. Strangely enough, the spot where it is marked on the map is the approximate location of the home in which I lived and the grade school which I attended some 70 years ago. I believe the date underneath the name Sand Hollow represents, on Army records, the date of the battle which resulted in the enormous casualty list of one Indian killed and one settler injured while loading his rifle.

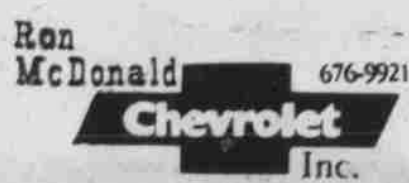
### Teens of the Month Eric Thompson Heppner
