

### Church marks 30th anniversary

A send off of 30 helium filled balloons, a special speaker, a picnic and a mortgage burning celebration marked the 30th anniversary of the local Nazarene Church.

The church opened August 14, 1953 in Ione with the Rev. Wilfred McKay, pastor. In 1959, the present building at 345 Gilmore St. was constructed and the church transferred to Heppner.

The Rev. Charles Wilkes was featured speaker during the morning worship service. He and his wife, Lois, pastored the church in Ione from 1956 to 1959. They are now pastoring the First Church of the Nazarene in Yakima, Wash.

Another highlight of the day was the presenting of a Distinguished Service Award to Ralph and Lou Crum of Ione, "for their 30 years of outstand-

ing service and support to the church," said the Rev. Floyd Wilks, present pastor of the church. Wilks explained that the church purchased the award from Nazarene headquarters in Kansas City. The money used to purchase the award is used for missionary work. He added that he believes that the Crums' award was the first given in this area.

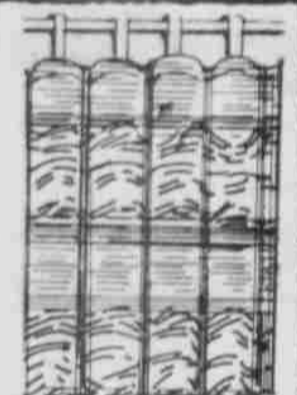

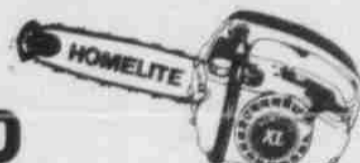

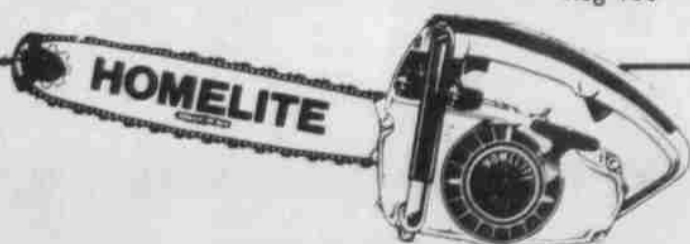
