New members were added and a new chairman chosen at a meeting of the Heppner City Planning Commission Monday night.

Joining the commission as new members were: Jerry Hollomon and Tom Reihl, both

Heppner businessmen, and David Allstott, a local building contractor.

Larry Bowman, an employee with the Forest Service, was elected chairman. He replaces Dick Bigelow who resigned from the planning

commission.

The commission conducted no business at the meeting; however, relations with the county planning commission were discussed.

"There are problems now between the city and county," stressed city Attorney Bill

Kuhn in reference to planning procedures. He suggested a review of the city's urban growth boundaries, and the way in which the city and county are managing the area.

## Census Bureau to conduct local survey

Local representatives of the Bureau of the Census will be conducting a survey in Morrow County during the week of September 19-24, 1983, to determine the extent people have been immunized against selected diseases. Leo C. Schilling, director of the bureau's regional office in Seattle, Wash. announced.

The survey is conducted

throughout the U.S. every year to provide information on immunization against measles, influenza, polio, diphtheria, whooping cough, tetanus, rubella and mumps needed for administration of health programs geared to disease prevention. These health questions are in addition to the usual ones asked in the monthly survey on employ-

ment and unemployment conducted nationwide by the bureau for the U.S. Department of Labor.

Results of the monthly employment survey provide data on conditions in the labor force, prime indicators of the economic health of the country. For example, in July the survey indicated that of the 111.9 million men and women

in the civilian labor force, 101.3 million were employed. The nation's unemployment rate was 9.5 percent, a drop of one-half percent from the June rate, Shilling explained.

Personal information supplied in the survey is kept strictly confidential by law and results are used only to compile statistical totals, he said.

## Cards begin quest for championship

The Ione Cardinal football team starts its quest for the Big Sky conference championship as they take on the Powder Valley Badgers on Friday, Sept. 16 in the North Powder at 2 p.m. Ione, however, doesn't start their Big Sky season until Friday, Sept. 30, when they tackle the Condon Blue Devils at home at

Ione has a new coach this year. Ron Mack. Mack led the junior high team last year to a 4-2 record. He takes over for Gordon Meyers, who in 22 years, won three state titles.

Seniors Craig Hams and Howard Leavitt return giving Ione perhaps the best backfield in Big Sky.

Two concerns for the Cards are the inexperience at quarterback and the line.

Denny Starr, a two-year starter, is gone, putting newcomer Randy McCabe as the probable starter at Q.B. with Mark Meyers as his backup.

Darrin Padberg, who played center last year, is the only player returning to the offensive line. Seniors Steve Mill-

man, Scott Barnett and Mike Douglas, juniors Don Doherty, Paul Zinter, Jeff Ball and Mark Meyers and sophomore Rod Taylor will see playing time on the line. Millman started as a sophomore.

Defensively the Cards are led by Hams, an all-star end a year ago, and defensive backs Leavitt and Mark Meyers. However, Hams may switch to linebacker. Mack also expects big things from Doherty and McCabe.

Ione's two toughest opponents are supposed to be Echo and Arlington. Echo is a state quarter-finalist from last year and some think the Cougars will win the state title this year. The Honkers are two-time Big Sky champs; they

won the state championship two years ago and were state semi-finalists last year. The Cards have both of those games at home, though.

Other members of this year's staff include junior Eric Cook, sophomore Brian Douglas and freshmen Ashley Conklin, Kierin Doherty, Chris Rea and Mike Rietmann, giving Ione the largest turnout in the Big Sky. Del LaRue is again the assistant coach.

Coach Mack had these comments on the team: "We have the people that have the potential to fill the spots left due to graduation. Our key to success depends on how quickly these people step in and pick up the slack."

## Lions to sponsor benefit golf tournament September 18

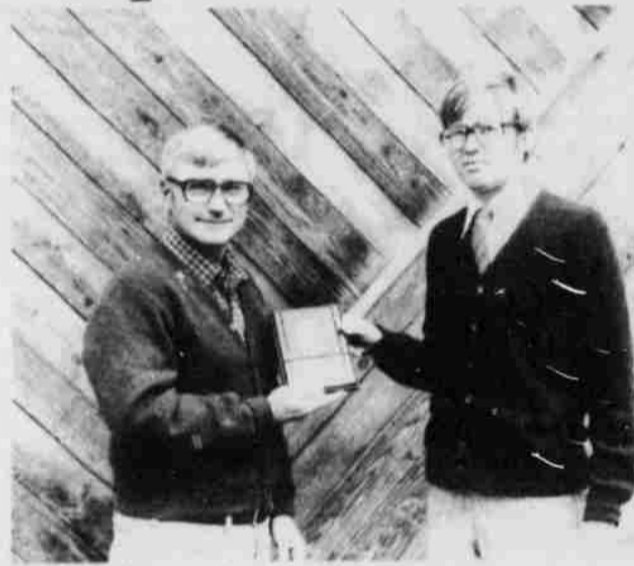

## Enrollment figures virtually unchanged from last fall

Fall enrollment figures in Morrow County schools are virtually unchanged from last year at this time, reports the Morrow County School District office in Lexington. This year, county-wide, a total of 1,707 students registered,

compared to 1,714 last fall.

Sam Boardman Elementary shows a decrease of 14 students, Ione Elementary School's enrollment is down by 10, Heppner Elementary is up by six, Columbia Junior High increased by 11 students, Ione Junior High gained two,

Heppner Junior High is up by seven, Riverside High School decreased by 26 students, Ione High School is only down one and Heppner High School's enrollment is down by six students.
