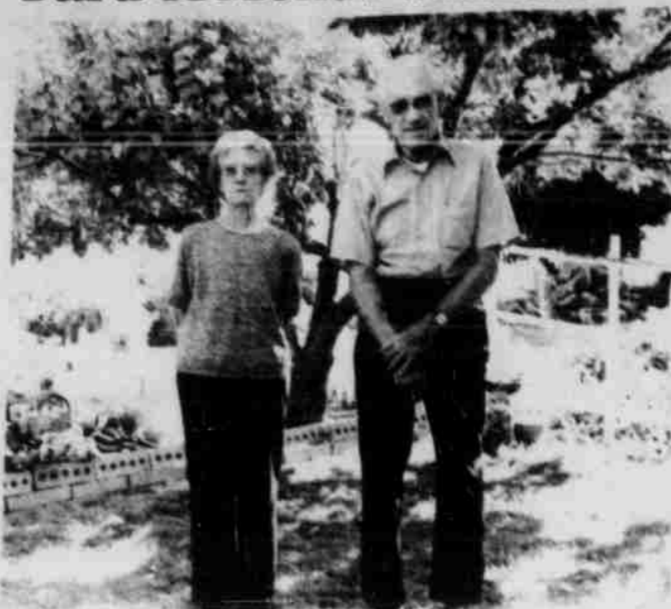

Kenneth and Myrtle Marshall's yard at 290 E. Main in Lexington was selected as September's Yard of the Month by the Lexington Garden Bugs.

Gardening together for the past 60 years, Kenneth and Myrtle spent their first years in Ellensburg, Wash. then moved to Lexington 41 years ago. They have landscaped the front of their yard simply, with a green hedge to the west and a well-groomed lawn in front, including the front parking area. Along the drive are colorful asters, and hollyhocks are getting ready to bloom next year.

They combined flowers and produce in the beds around the house. Beautiful giant zinnias add glamour to the nicely painted chicken house. As you look more closely, animal figurines find their place

amongst the foliage — almost looking alive. The back yard is shaded by the apricot trees and the garden is surrounded by grapes, Concord and Smiths.

Asked how they get such nice looking plants, Myrtle responded, "You have to keep building up the soil each year. We keep a compost pile of grass clippings, chicken manure and whatever else we happen to have. Then we put it all back into the soil."

Kenneth shared that he had just planted more lettuce and radishes on a south exposure. He said that the lettuce would be good until a hard frost.

Kenneth and Myrtle are proud of their yard and enjoy resting in the back patio watching the plants grow, bloom and produce for their beauty and their eating enjoyment.

Morrow Co. Mental Health expands

Morrow County Mental Health Service has expanded its services and is presently operating as a three-county operation, which now includes Gilliam and Wheeler counties.

In explaining the program's expansion, Dr. Terry Templeman, director of the program, explained that mental health services were previously handled in those two counties by one director, and the turnover of directors was high. The last director resigned in February and the counties requested to the state that other arrangements for mental health services be made. The state program contacted Morrow County's Mental Health Service about contracting services for Gilliam and Wheeler counties and Morrow Co. agreed to do so. However, those counties have their own advisory boards.

Handling mental health services for those two counties is Kelly Sager, who graduated with a Bachelors degree in Psychology from Eastern Oregon State College in June. He worked under Dr. Templeman last year in an internship program before he graduated.

Sager, 23, now lives in Condon, and is working in Fossil, Spray, Mitchell and Olex as well. One day each week, he works in Morrow County. He works with a children's group home in Spray, and works with some schools in the two-county area.

Debra McIntosh is also a

new addition to Morrow County's Mental Health Service. With a Masters in Educational Psychology, she will work with schools in the district 30 hours each week.

In the past, the mental health service has provided 20 hours of service per week to the school district which included testing, some counseling and consulting with teachers. Templeman explained, however, he said, the demand for services has grown and Morrow County Mental Health wasn't able to meet all of the district's needs. This year the school district increased their contract for 30 hours a week.

McIntosh will also be working out of the Boardman mental health office along with Alison Turner, who has a Masters in Psychology, and with Dr. Templeman, who works out of that office two days each month. In addition, two psychiatrists from the Eastern Oregon Hospital and Training Center meet with the program personnel once a month.

McIntosh, 30, comes to Morrow Co. from Fullerton, Calif. She has a Masters in Education Psychology and has conducted extensive school psychology work in Alaska and Arizona, and has also participated in research and evaluations of children.

Templeman said Morrow County Mental Health Service will provide a broad range of services out of all three counties.
