Ione had 150 yards on the ground and 75 yards in the air for 225 yards of total offense. The main factor in the Cardinals' loss was that they were playing against bigger, more experienced people.

Coach Mark Jones remarked "We improved since last week but we are not near our full potential and we need improvement every week. Our defense needs to tackle better and we need our offensive linemen to hold their blocks longer."

Ione will face the Arlington Honkers on Thursday, Oct. 7, at 2 p.m. in Ione.
