Area extension study groups to learn problem-solving methods

Moving to a strange community, children growing up and leaving home or beginning a new job are changes people face daily. Although each change may be upsetting, there are ways to make it easier, points out Dawn C. Hawkins, Oregon State University Extension agent in

Umatilla County. Teaching people how to use problem-solving methods to make such changes easier is one of the goals of the lesson called "Making Life Transitions" which will be studied by Umatilla and Morrow County Extension study groups during January through March.

Mrs. Hawkins explains. Training for the volunteer leader-teachers who will present the lesson to the various groups is set for Wednesday, Oct. 26, 10 a.m., in Pendleton at the Peace Lutheran Church. Representatives of other groups interested in the

program are welcome to attend also, the agent adds. Marcelle Straatman, OSU Extension Service human development specialist developed the lesson. The program seeks to help people understand the process of transition and change in various situations and to enable them to analyze techniques to make the transition easier, the specialist stresses.

The lesson on "Making Life Transitions" was developed because "change today is so radical and so fast that it tends to be overwhelming," Mrs. Straatman stresses. "We can't afford not to take responsibility for developing a strategy that helps us make changes effectively and efficiently."

"Personal change is a transition from an old way to a new way of life that makes sense to our inner selves. It doesn't mean that old things, people or feelings are abandoned. They just become less important."
