

# School district may be interested in helping construct baseball diamond

The Morrow County School District might be interested in helping with construction of a baseball diamond along Willow Creek Lake, the board indicated Monday.

The Heppner Economic Development Corporation, a local group formed to stimulate growth in the area, has approached the district about participating in a planned campground on Willow Creek Lake, which would include a

baseball diamond. Although the school district made no definite commitment to the project, it did say it was interested.

"We have spent very little on playgrounds in the Heppner area the past 10 years, and this is something we may want to look at," said Superintendent Matt Doherty.

Doherty said the baseball diamond would be of value to the district as a better place to hold games. The high school now plays its games at the fairgrounds.

The campground project, which was initiated by the Development Corp., would include overnight camping sites, restrooms, a picnic shelter and a ball field. Proposed site for the project is at the upper end of the new Willow Creek Lake, which was formed by construction of the Willow Creek Dam.

Some funding for the project may come from the Corps, with in-kind work such as laying sod, building picnic tables and other work being provided locally.

Bob Byrd, a board member from Irrigon, told the board to check out Corps requirements on the project before district

participation. "If the Corps is putting up some dollars, then they might call it a public facility. If you (school district) have a game scheduled and somebody wants to have a sociable softball game at the same time, it may be first come, first served."

He said in a similar project in Irrigon, the Corps put up the money, and "the baseball people put it in."

In other business, the board: —decided not to change a district policy on conflict of interest as requested by a Boardman-Irrigon group. Several people had asked the district to change part of the policy which prohibits the immediate family of any advisory committee member from working fulltime for the district in that advisory area. The group said the policy did not prohibit boardmember families from working for the district, and was therefore an unfair policy.

—denied a request by the local teacher's union that a second teacher be added to the district screening committee, which is to review applications for the superintendent's job. Matt Doherty has submit-

ted his resignation, and the school board has designated a screening committee to review applicants. The committee will be made up of three boardmembers, three advisory members, two principals, one teacher and one classified employee. The teachers had asked for one more representative Monday; however, the board designated a classified person instead. Names of those serving on the committee will be announced later.

—approved a new district staffing plan which sets upper and lower limits on the number of students in a grade before the district will either add or take away a teacher. The plan was broken into sections for the larger and smaller schools in the district.

—voted to hire Ken Grieb, boys JV basketball coach at Heppner, and Christian Rauch, boys freshman basketball coach at Heppner. Neither are teachers at the school.

—voted to hire Hope Thompson, Arlington, as a first grade teacher at Sam Boardman Elementary School. The teacher was needed because of large enrollment in that grade.

# Senator Timms to run for four-year term

Oregon State Senator Gene Timms, R-Burns, has formally announced his candidacy for election to a full four-year term representing District No. 30. Timms was appointed to complete the unexpired portion of Congressman Bob Smith's senate term following Smith's election to the United States House of Representatives.

"When I accepted appointment to the Oregon Senate," said Timms, "I pledged to work hard for the residents of Eastern Oregon and use good judgment and common sense in their behalf. The 1983 Regular and Special Session of the Legislature were difficult but provide me with necessary experience which can continue to benefit the people of District No. 30."

A native of Burns, Timms utilized his small business background as the owner of Alpine Creamery on three Senate Committees during the 1983 session. Timms served as a member of the Business and Consumer Affairs Committee, Commerce, Banking and Public Finance Committee and

Transportation and Tourism Committee. "Each committee assignment blended well with my background and experience," said Timms, "it was very gratifying to see Oregon's tourism industry move out of the shadows into its proper priority within the Department of Economic Development."

Prior to his appointment to the Senate, Timms served as state vice-president and secretary-treasurer of the Jaycees and as a member of the Junior Chamber International Senate. He also received the Distinguished Service Award, Jaycee of the Year, and Boss of the Year Award in Harney County.

Timms has also served as president of the Harney County Chamber of Commerce, as a member of Associated Oregon Industries, and was trustee of the Oregon Beer and Wine Distributors. He has been active with the Small Business Administration, and was a trustee with Harney County Industries.

"It has been my pleasure to represent the people of Eastern Oregon," said Timms, "my door will always be open to District No. 30 residents as we work together to resolve problems and point towards Oregon's future."

# Simpson announces he won't seek re-election

Representative Max Simpson (D. Baker) announced October 12 that he would not seek re-election to a sixth term as State Representative from Dist. 59, Morrow, Baker, Grant and Crook counties.

Simpson said that although the complexion of the legislature has changed radically during his tenure, and is no longer a citizen legislature; he believes in that concept and 10 years is enough.

Simpson was critical of legislative leadership and indicated his disgust of the recent special session which he termed a "political circus and an affront to the intellect of taxpayers." "Leadership is at such a low ebb that even the

committee system is being bastardized," he said.

The representative indicated that his reason for making the announcement early on was because a number of people throughout the district had indicated their interest in filing — providing he did not — and he wanted to give them all ample time to get their campaigns in order. He said he would make no endorsements at this time but urged that people take a long look at candidates before pledging support, particularly from the perspective of any connection with powerful special interest.

"I have enjoyed wide based and unique support," Simpson added, "having been the nominee of both political parties in every election since I won the seat 10 years ago. I

thank the voters for their faithful support." He indicated that he was very comfortable with the representation that he has given the district. "I did everything I said I would do, and now it is time to look to personal matters," he said.

The veteran legislator has served as co-chair of the Joint Trade and Economic Development Commission, vice-chair on the Transportation Commission, chair of the Natural Resource and Public Safety Committees of Ways and Means and the State Emergency Board. Simpson concluded that his one regret would be that Eastern Oregon would lose the powerful Ways and Means seat which he held, regardless of which party prevails in the next election. Simpson will serve until January of 1985.
