

Varsity Cards defeat Condon Blue Devils 52-42

The lone boys' varsity basketball team is 3-5 after defeating the Condon Blue Devils 52-42 on Tuesday, Dec. 20, on the Devils' home court.

Both teams had problems scoring any points in the opening period. Condon took a six to four lead. All of the Cardinals points came from Randy McCabe.

Ione came right back with 17 second stanza points compared with 14 Blue Devil points. Scott Miller and Darrell Aamodt kept Condon close with six points apiece. The Cards had an advantage of 21-20 at the break.

McCabe tossed in 11 third quarter points as Ione increased his lead to 36-30.

Ione went on to win 52-42 by out-scoring Condon 16 to 12 in the final quarter.

McCabe led the Cardinals in scoring with 23 points. Darrin Padberg came off the bench to add 10. Craig Hams and Howard Leavitt grabbed 13

rebounds each and McCabe got 10 as Ione had a season high 46 rebounds. Hams also passed for five assists.

Freshman Miller tossed in 12 for Condon.

The Cardinals made 16 of 28 free throws for 57 percent and 18 of 53 field goals for 34 percent. The Blue Devils were

17 of 60 for 28 percent from the field and eight of 12 for 67 percent from the foul line.

On Friday, Jan. 6, Ione opens its Big Sky Conference league games with a trip to Helix to play the Grizzlies. The Cards then go to Arlington on Saturday, Jan. 7, for a match with the Honkers.

Pointer led the Cardinals with nine points, all of them in the concluding half.

Miller and Todd Barnett had 11 each for Condon.

Anglers asked to return tags

Anglers who had a salmon-steelhead tag for the year 1983 are asked to return them to the Fish and Wildlife Department immediately after expiration on December 31, the department has stated.

The tags may be deposited in the cardboard boxes provided at licensing agencies, or simply mail it to the department at P.O. Box 3503, Portland, Oregon 97208. In addition to the information that must be recorded on the tag when a salmon or steelhead is caught and kept, anglers are reminded there are blanks that ask for approximate number of days fished and numbers of fish caught and released. These should be filled out before the tag is returned.

New salmon-steelhead tags for 1984, available from license agents now, will be a little different than the 1983 cards. Swartz says. Instead of one code number for steelhead, the new cards will show two codes. One is for steelhead with a clipped fin, indicating a hatchery steelhead marked by the department, and another code is designated for steelhead with no clipped fins.

BMCC tuition to remain unchanged

Tuition at Blue Mountain Community College will remain at the same level for a third year in accordance with a decision made by the college board at their December 21 meeting, announced a college spokesperson.

Since the 1982-83 school year, tuition at the college has been set at \$15 per credit hour or \$180 per term for full-time indistrict students. That rate will remain in effect for the 1984-85 school year.

Comparative tuition figures presented to the board by College President Ron Daniels showed BMCCM to be in line with annual tuition charges of central Oregon Community College, Portland Community College and Tillamook Bay Community College Education District.

In other money matters, the board also left equalization reimbursement at the current level of four cents per mile. Equalization is paid to full-time students residing outside of a 10 mile radius from campus. Mileage reimbursement for staff using private vehicles on college business was left at the current 18.5 cents per mile rate.

Kevin Kimball, representative of Morrison & Fife accounting firm, presented the 1982-83 audit report to the board. With some suggestions for budgeting grant monies, Kimball pronounced the college to be "in a very strong cash position at this time."

Action on dispensation of 1982 overcollected taxes was postponed pending a ruling by the Oregon Department of Revenue. The college has requested that the tax collector's error be rectified by applying the overcollected taxes as a tax offset against Umatilla County's portion of the college's 1984 tax levy.

In other business, the college board:

- appointed community representatives Phil Houk, Pendleton, and Sherra Spike, Hermiston, to the Long-Range Planning Committee.
- approved a grant application by the college study center to fund the acquisition of a computer and computer software. The computer will be used by students in the study center who are working on a high school completion degree or by English as a Second Language students. A total of \$5,104 is requested in the grant application.
- extended the contract of President Daniels through June 30, 1987.
