

Rathbun sworn in as Heppner city police chief

New city police chief Doug Rathbun was sworn into office at a meeting of the Heppner City Council on Tuesday, Jan. 3. Rathbun replaces Dean Gilman who has served as chief of police for the past 24 years.

In other business, the council:

- voted Warren Plocharsky as council chairman for 1984.
- heard a letter from the state highway department stating that a rubber stop flap has been installed on the street between Coast to Coast store and McDonald's Chev-

rolet garage in Heppner. The state also said it will pave the graveled area west of Coast to Coast in late spring or early summer, and will count traffic to determine if a flashing light beacon is justified there.

— heard that a claim of damages for false arrest has been filed against the city by William Edward Wilson. Wilson is asking for \$5,000 in damages from the city for a stolen car arrest on December 8, 1983. According to the city police, Wilson was arrested after police received notification that a pickup truck he had was stolen in California. Po-

lice say the car passed through several owners in California, and was reported stolen when money owed on one of the sales was not paid. Charges against Wilson were dropped.

— heard a letter from Mary Roberts, commissioner of the Bureau of Labor and Industries, regarding the city's responsibility for enforcing Oregon's prevailing wage rate law, and a list of contractors ineligible to receive public works contracts. The list is filed in the Bureau of Labor file.

IHS girls fall to Helix

Ione's girls' basketball team fell to the Helix Grizzlies 56 - 39 on Friday, Jan. 6.

Helix ran out to a quick 18 - 8 advantage in the opening quarter. Stephanie Andrus ripped the nets for 10 quarter points for Helix while Sandi Wright threw in six Cardinal points.

Ione stayed with the Grizzlies in the second period by out-scoring them 13 to 22. Helix led 30 to 21 at the break. Wright and Deena Hams led Ione with six and five points in the period.

In the third stanza it was Andrus again leading the Helix attack with nine of her team's 16 points. The Cards only managed three points and trailed 46 - 24.

The fourth quarter belonged to Ione 15 - 10, but the Grizzlies won 56 - 39. Andi Rudisill was five of six from the free throw line in the quarter for five Ione points.

Andrus was the game's leading scorer with 21 points. Nikki Lembecke added 13 for

Home canned foods need check for frost damage

Due to continuing freezing temperatures, home canning stored in unheated garage and storage areas may be sustaining damage.

Inspection of canning jars may indicate a layer of ice crystals floating on the preserved fruits and vegetables.

According to Marge Woodburn, head of the Department of Home Economics at Oregon State University in Corvallis, unless the seal is broken, the contents of the frozen canned goods are safe to use and store. However, considering texture and taste, "the quality may be less desirable," she said.

Jars of food with lids which are convex or have loosened due to ice expansion but which remain frozen should be refrigerated and used as soon as possible.

Contents of unsealed jars which have defrosted completely should not be used because of possible contamination.

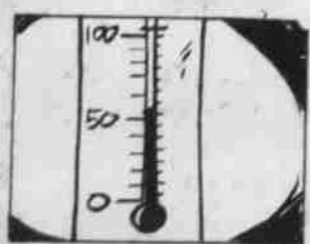
