

Tigers control Mustangs in low scoring ball game

Scott Nevil scored 12 points and Kevin Porter added 10 to lead the Stanfield Tigers to a low scoring 44-35 victory over the Heppner Mustangs last Saturday night.

"We just didn't execute as well as Stanfield did. And our defense broke down in the fourth quarter," said Heppner Coach Brent Eggers. "We could play much better offensively."

Heppner, to put it bluntly, had a terrible first quarter. Out-scored by Scott Nevil alone, Stanfield jumped out to a 13-5 first quarter lead. A lead an opponent needs against Heppner at home. The Mustangs, however, made it a game in the second quarter with a triumphant comeback and were only down by one, 20-19, at halftime. The third quarter was essentially slow paced with good defense in

both halves of the quarter. Heppner was only down by three entering the final stanza. That's when Stanfield took control. The Mustangs got into some foul trouble and Stanfield shot 16 free throws to cushion the lead and the victory.

"Our only goal is to win the next game," said Eggers.

John Martin led Heppner with 11 points and grabbed down eight rebounds. Greg Orr added 10, but shot only 2 for 10 from the field.

Our reason to sum up Heppner's loss was a futile 12 for 35 shooting average from the field. Stanfield was 18 for 40.

Former Heppner man ambushed in Philippines; family moves

David and Barbara Anderson, formerly of Heppner, have recently moved from the Philippines to Santo Domingo, Dominican Republic.

While in the Philippines on the island of Mindanao, Mr. Anderson was employed by United Brand Fruit Co., now known there as Mindanao Fruit Co.

On December 19, Anderson and five other employees of the fruit company were ambushed by the New Peoples Army while on their way home to Davao City, according to "The MINDANAO DAILY MIRROR." One of the men was killed in the incident. According to Barbara Bloodworth of Heppner, Mrs. Anderson's stepmother, Mr. Anderson's arm was grazed and his shirt torn by a bullet. He also received glass shivers in his back when the windows of the vehicle in which they were riding were shot out. Mrs. Bloodworth said a total of 22 bullet holes were found in the vehicle.

According to the Philippine newspaper, "Anderson, who was himself slightly injured, got off the Bronco service vehicle and ran back to the office of the Agricultural Ventures Corporation (DAVCO) about a mile from the ambush scene. The employees he left at the ambush scene were made to lie on the faces by the armed men and were divested of their cash and wrist watches after they were identified through their respective I.D. cards. Anderson said they were brought down from Sirib aboard a DAVCO vehicle but were intercepted at Malagos by the Philippine Marines, who

investigated him over the incident."

The article also states, "The incident is unexplainable, according to Anderson. He said they have been going around the area for a couple of years now inspecting the pineapple fruits for quality control and it was only now that the incident happened to them. They do not carry arms or money because their job is only to provide technical knowhow to grow pineapple in the area, Anderson said."

The Andersons had been living in the Philippines for the last two years. They had lived there before, about four years

ago, before moving to Umatilla for two years, and then returned to the islands.

Now settled in Santo Domingo, Anderson is again raising pineapple for United. Two of the couple's three children, Anissa, 15, and Severn, six, moved there with them. Another daughter, Katrina, 16, remained in the Philippines where she is attending school in Baguio City near Manila. She will join them in June.

Barbara is the daughter of James Bloodworth of Heppner and LaVonne Bergstrom. David is the son of Neils Anderson, a former Morrow County extension agent.



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Adult ed programs offering expanded learning opportunities

Blue Mountain Community College offers several adult education programs in Heppner for residents of south Morrow County. The program has been available in Heppner for about 12 years now.

Classes offered through this program include English as a Second Language, G.E.D. (General Education Development) classes to prepare for the G.E.D. test, Adult High School Diploma classes, and Adult Basic Education classes for people wanting to improve on general skills, such as English, math and reading. Also, classes to prepare for the U.S. citizenship test are available.

Program instructor Joy Krein said fall term was very busy with about 15 students enrolled. Presently, four winter term, there are 10 students taking classes, as well as three high school students who are concurrently enrolled. During this term, one student is taking the Adult High School Diploma course, one is enrolled in Adult Basic Education for skill improvement, four are taking English as a Second Language and four others are taking G.E.D. classes.

Andrae and Barbara Doboszynski and Somchith Thongdy of Heppner are three of the students taking English as a Second Language classes. "All of them have made great progress," Krein said. The Doboszynskis came to Heppner from Poland and have been enrolled in the program since September. Mrs. Thongdy came here with her family

from Laos. She has been taking the class for three years. Krein tells the public not to be afraid to speak to the E.S.L. students, just speak clearly and slowly.

The classes run throughout the school year and a 10-week program is scheduled during the summer months. Students can attend classes on a drop in basis and can utilize the program on a schedule that is

most convenient to them. However, "Attendance is the key," Krein states, and adds that the students are very diligent in coming to class.

During the last five years, since Krein has been instructing the classes, five people have received adult high school diplomas and 11 others have received G.E.D. certificates. Krein said that several people have started the programs in Heppner but later left the area and completed the programs elsewhere. Several of her former students have gone on to receive higher education.

Krein, who has a B.S. in elementary education and a current teaching certificate, is aided in instruction by Peggy Fishburn of Heppner, an aide, and Nella Britt of Lexington, a volunteer.

Classes are held at the Heppner Neighborhood Center on Mondays from 1 to 4 p.m. and on Wednesdays from 7 to 10 p.m. There is no charge to enroll, except a \$5 fee for

materials in the Adult High School Diploma class.
