

Cardinals lose to Falcons in Big Sky Conference game

"Overall I think we played well except for a couple key turnovers late in the fourth quarter. We hit six more field goals than Wahtonka, but they hit 22 of 26 free throws and that was the difference. When a team shoots that well from the line, their tough to beat," said Heppner Coach Mike Royer.

Pam Orr had 12 points for the Fillies while Jodi Padberg had 10. Lana Reid had eight rebounds, Steph Payne had six assists and Orr had four steals.

On Friday, Feb. 3 Heppner will travel to Maupin for a 6 p.m. game with Wasco County.

Actually filmed inside the prison, this documentary features the stories of four

notorious criminals. Interviews conducted by Art Linkletter and the director of I.P.M., Chaplain Ray, focus on rehabilitation as a result of conversion to Christianity. said a spokesperson for the church.

From inside the gas chamber, Jerry Graham says, "I came very close to ending it all right here." In stark contrast to his life of crime, he now directs a ranch for abused

children. James Williams served time in San Quentin after a gun battle with police. Now he's employed by a criminal justice organization teaching men "the way to go out," as he puts it.

Another changed person is George Meyer. Al Capone's favorite driver. Now 74, he counsels teenagers about the evils of drug abuse.
