**10 Years Ago**  
Thursday, April 11, 1974  
The U.S. Forest Service reported the beginning of the "open air" classes at the U.S. Forest Service station at Tupper. Sixth grade students from Heppner would study plant and animal life, water study, soil and geology, map and compass courses, and survival with emphasis on group living in this way from the normal classroom setting.

The Heppner High School baseball team placed second at an invitational tournament meet at Athena. Ten Teams competed. The H.H.S. track team earned a 91-43 victory at Wahtonka.

**25 Years Ago**  
Thursday, April 9, 1959

The "car stacking" craze sweeping high school and college campuses came to Heppner. Twenty-three Heppner High School students were reportedly stacked in a Nash Metropolitan owned by Doug Gribble.

The Heppner City Council approved an ordinance calling for the sale of \$140,000 in water bonds and issued a call for bids.

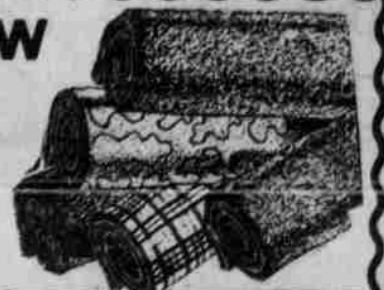
a majority of those in attendance at the budget meeting.

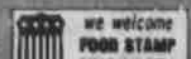
