Mary Campbell has been named Resident of the Month for April at Pioneer Memorial Nursing Home in Heppner.

Mary was born February 24, 1894, to John and Mary Butler in County Cork, Ireland. She recalls emigrating to New York in 1916 where she joined other members of her family.

She married William H. Campbell January 1917 at St. Patrick's Cathedral in New York City. William had also emigrated from Ireland, and settled in Lonerock, Oregon, where he and his four brothers were engaged in sheep ranching. Mary met William while he was on a trip to New York.

She recalls that after a honeymoon at Niagara Falls, they returned to the Lonerock area where they lived until the late 1930's.

At that time they purchased a wheat and cattle ranch seven miles southwest of Condon, located in Snipton Canyon where they lived and remained in sheep operation and membership of the Wool Growers Association for many years.

Mary and William had three children, Marion Ansen, Helen Myers, and John (Jack) Campbell. Mary's family remembers her for the many poems she wrote as well as the lyrics to a song she composed and recorded in tribute to the late Bing Crosby.

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Ione city council proposes Revenue Sharing Funds

The Ione City Council met Tuesday, April 3 at City Hall in Ione. Diana Starr, city recorder reports that the following business was conducted: -held a public hearing for the proposed 1984-85 budget which had been recommended to the council.

-held a public hearing to propose uses for State Revenue sharing funds. Some of the suggestions for use included

donating money to the little league, installing a new floor in city hall, donating money for equipment to the fire department.

-held a public hearing to read an ordinance declaring the city's election to receive State Revenue Sharing Funds. The council moved and seconded that all three readings of the ordinance be adopted.

-heard a request from John Marick for a grant of an

extension until June 1 to tear down his house on "A" street. The council approved the request.

-read a proposed agreement between the city of Ione and Morrow County Grain Growers. A motion was made and approved to provide water to the M.C.G.G. Chemical plant.

-agreed to permit the Cub Scouts to plant a flowering cherry tree in the city park.
