D.A.'s Report

Two men who were arraigned for two counts of Sexual Abuse in the First Degree were sentenced in Circuit Court reports Morrow County District Attorney, Richard McNeerney.

Salvador Farrias and Adan Farrias, both of Irriagon, were sentenced to three years each of two counts to the Oregon State Corrections Facility. The sentences are to run concurrently.

The imposition of the Correctional Facility time is suspended on the condition that the defendants successfully complete five years of probation with the following special conditions: a) Six months in the Umatilla County Jail, with no credit for time served, b) To reimburse the State of Oregon for Court Appointed Attorney fees in the amount of \$497, said money to be paid to the Morrow County Circuit Court Clerk in Heppner, c) That the Defendant is not to associate with any female under the age of 18 years, d) The defendant is to abide by all the general terms, and conditions of probation.

All of the sentence is to be superseded if the United States enters a valid deportation order against the two defendants.

The Morrow County Sheriff's Department office at the Morrow County Courthouse in Heppner handled the following calls, cases and reports during the past week:
