Many of the fifth and growing sixth generation descendants of widowed Catherine (Grant) Doherty, who came to Eastern Oregon from Ireland one hundred years ago last October, still farm on family-owned land in Morrow County while others have gone elsewhere and have taken different lines of work. All, however, feel strong ties to their home area, and many will return on Sunday, May 27, for the Pioneer Reunion-Picnic.

Two great-granddaughters of Kate's oldest daughter Sarah Cunningham are expected to come from Idaho. Large groups of descendants of her younger daughter Mary Kenny and younger son James G. will be present. Her older son Barney never married. Two granddaughters of Kate are living in Heppner; Cecelia (Kenny) Bucknum and Helen (Doherty) Dyer, neither of whom had children. Helen is co-chairman for the 1984 reunion.

The update of present Doherty family members continues with the grandchildren of James G. and Catherine (Doherty) Doherty. Their oldest daughter Mary McLaughlin's oldest daughter Kathryn Wright is retired and living in Pendleton with her daughter. Second of their 13 grandchildren Dan, is retired from highway work and lives in Rhinebeck, N.Y. near his three children and grandchildren. Granddaughter Nonie Pointer is also in Pendleton, her oldest son Hank lives near Ione, her sons Tom and Mark are farming the Don Pointer land at Lexington, her two daughters live in Portland and youngest son Charlie lives in Redmond.

Jim McLaughlin lives in Spokane, Virginia is a L.P.N. in Pendleton and is married to Jake Penner. Her twin Joe is currently Pendleton's mayor.

Bob McLaughlin and his wife Betty are on the Cornelius McLaughlin Ranch in Dixie Canyon at the top of Franklin Hill and their six children attend Heppner schools. Herb owns an auto and truck repair business in Pendleton. Sally McLaughlin married a lawyer and they

live near Tacoma. Mike is a construction supervisor for Pacific N.W. Bell in Pendleton. Terry is an oral language specialist in Huntington Beach, CA. Sarah's daughter Lorraine, mother of three girls, lived in Tacoma. Sarah's son Owen Jr. was killed in W.W.II; son Dick, father of four sons, is retired and lives in the family home in Tacoma.

Nora Turner's daughter Jean, Mrs. Bob Runnion, works in the Oregon Education Association office in Pendleton. Mora's son Kenneth and wife Jean Ann (Swanson) farm the expanded Sam Turner Ranch in Sand Hollow, and they and their four daughters are active in the Heppner community. Ann Miller's son Tad Miller and wife Melba, now grandparents, and their four children farm the Harvey Miller land near Lexington, the children were in Heppner schools. Tad's sisters Colleen Pinckney and Marian Miller died quite young. Colleen left two sons who live in Washington state. Ann's son James and wife Earlene live in Hermiston near their three children and grandchildren.

Margaret Doherty Howard's daughter Mary Anne, the mother of three in service representative at the Social Security Teleservice Center in Seattle. Margaret's son James is a teacher near Seattle and has five or six sons. Her daughter Christy is living and working in California. Tina McLaughlin's son Larry is with the J.C. Penny Co. in Portland. Tina's daughter Kay and her husband Ed Brown live on the John McLaughlin family farm at Sandy. Tina's son Charles is in California and her daughter Ann Wardy lives in Sandy.

Bernard and Jerry (Castel) Doherty's first daughter Mary died at age six. Their son Dennis, formerly Morrow County District Attorney, now practices law in Hermiston. married Mark Tullis; they live in Heppner where she works for the county assessor. These seven fourth-generation of Blackhorse-Doherty children attended Lexington School until it closed in 1959 and the Heppner schools and all seven completed college.

47 ☐ DAVID MARSHALL NISSMAN	Explanation: The current school district tax base is \$742,978.00 and represents 13.4% of the total taxes needed to fund the district budget. The remaining 86.6% of taxes needed must be levied outside the tax base in order to operate the schools.

On March 27, 1984, voters in the College district approved, by a wide margin, an operating tax levy of \$3,190,237. The College is now asking the voters to establish that exact amount as a tax base. Since its formation in 1962, the College has operated without a tax base. The College is now required by law to submit a tax base measure to the voters. College growth has stabilized and approval of a tax base is important to the College.

A tax base would provide an improved financial foundation for existing programs and allow for more efficient planning. Any increase above 6% would still require voter approval.
