Telephone billing to change

Beginning May 7, one-and-a-half million customers in Oregon, Washington, and Northern Idaho will receive separate bills from AT&T for all leased telephones at their homes and businesses said a spokesperson for AT&T Information Systems recently.

The charges are not new—they are simply separated from the old phone bill and mailed in a separate envelope. The amount of the monthly charge may be adjusted for business customers, reflecting a change to the new national lease rate approved by the FCC.

Previously, all equipment charges for leased telephones were included in monthly bills from Pacific Northwest Bell, along with charges for local telephone service and long distance.

Thinclads place 2nd, 5th at championship meet

Heppner tracksters tuned up for the upcoming District 7-A track and field meet last Saturday, May 5 by competing in the Columbia Basin Conference championship meet at The Dalles.

The boys had their best team effort of the season placing in a tie for fifth place and could have placed higher except one runner was held out of an event he could have scored well in.

Seconds were earned by Sid Kennedy in the javelin with a personal best of 164'2", John Martin in the 800 meter run with a time of 2:05.7 and John Moyer with a leap of 39'11 1/2" in the triple jump.

Collecting third place

awards were the relay team of Kennedy, Moyer, Archie Lucas and Eric Thompson running :46.3, Moyer in the long jump with a leap of 19'11" and Thompson in the 100 meter dash running :11.8. Todd Lindsay collected the lone fourth place with a 5'8" high jump effort.

Getting fifth place ribbons were Kennedy in the discus with a throw of 111 feet, Lucas with a 18'2" long jump and Thompson, 38'8 1/2" in the triple jump. Scott Buschke was sixth in the high jump with a 5'4" effort.

Two school records highlighted the girls performances. Jodi Padberg ran a personal best in the 1500

meters to lower her school mark set last year to 5:19. The other new H.S. record was turned in by Pam Orr who ran 16.4 in the 100 meter high hurdles to lower the mark set earlier this year. Both were second place finishes.

Blue ribbons were won by Stephanie Payne who captured the 100 and 200 meter dashes with times of 13.1 and 28.4 respectively. The 200 mark ties a state's best she ran last week. She also finished fourth in the long jump with a 15'3" mark.

Orr placed second in the javelin. Another second was earned by Padberg in the 800 with a 2:33 running and the 400 relay team of Janelle Mc-

Elhany, Padberg, Orr and Payne ran to a red with a :53.9 clocking.

Melinda Eubanks collected a pair of third place efforts with throws of 31'11 1/2" in the shot put and 87'7 1/2" in the discus. Sandra Wattenburger placed third in the high jump at 4'8". McElhany ran fifth in the high hurdles with an 18.3 time and Nancy Martin tied for fifth in the high jump.

Sixth place finishes were collected by Missy Gates in the 1500 meters with 6:08.4, Martin in the 800 with a 2:51 time and Lana Reid in the 3,000 meters running 14:02.

This weekend the Heppner tracksters are involved in the two-day District 7-A meet in Umatilla with the top two

place finishers and others meeting qualifying standards earning the right to the state Class A meet in Portland, May 18-19.

On Friday, preliminaries will be held in the running events slated to begin at 5:30 p.m. with the final running to be conducted on Saturday beginning at 1 p.m. Finals will be held Friday in the girls shot put, long jump, and javelin and the boys high jump and discus with all other field event finals on Saturday.

Sherman County is the favored team to win the girls district meet with Wahtonka favored to win the boys.

"We could be in the thick of the battle for the girls' title," said head coach Dale Conklin, "but we haven't been competitive enough in the past to win it. We need super efforts out of everyone and we haven't been getting them, except from a few individuals."

"But, our main concern this weekend is to get as many as we can qualified for the state meet. That is our main concern," Conklin concluded.

Final team scores for the girls were Sherman County 113, Heppner 91 1/2, Wahtonka 64, Weston-McEwen 55 1/2, Wasco County 42, Umatilla 35, Pilot Rock 22, Stanfield and Riverside 20 each. Boys scores were Wahtonka 118, Umatilla 101, Sherman County 61, Riverside 54, Heppner 53, Pilot Rock 53, Stanfield 48, Weston-McEwen 34 and Wasco County 14.

Leading the boys was Ken Snider. He won the discus and the softball throw, and earned a second in the 100 meter hurdles and a third in the 300 hurdles.

Ione went 1-2 in the shot put with Doug Roaf first, and Gary Rea second. In the discus Rea was third and Roaf was fourth.

Kevin Ball and Dustin Padberg placed third and fourth in the high jump respectively.

Runner Tim Beeson placed second in the 400. He was on the 1200 medley relay team of Doug Roaf, Dustin Padberg, and Brian Ball which finished second.

For the girls, Jill Conklin won the high and long jumps,

and the 200 meters. She was on the second place medley relay team of Linda Morter, Angie Rudisill, and Kris Anderson.

Anderson won the 800, and was second in the 400. Morter ran second in the 1200, plus fifth in the 400.

Rudisill won the softball throw and was second in both the long jump and the 100.

Thrower Rondi Tews won the discus, put the shot second, and threw the softball for fifth place.

Katie Doherty ran third in the 200 and tossed the discus for a fourth place.

Michelle Beck picked up fourths in the 100 and the 300 hurdles.

3 HHS records set at Wasco

Three Heppner High School records and continued improvements by several individuals highlighted track action for local thinclads at the Wasco County Invitational track meet held in The Dalles, Friday, April 27.

Pam Orr collected two of the school records and contributed to the third to lead the Heppner girls. Orr broke her own record in the javelin by throwing 129'8". The mark

She also ran 17.2 in the high hurdles for a new H.S. mark. Orr with Nancy Martin, Jodi Padberg and Stephanie Payne took six-tenths of a second off the existing school mark in the 1600-relay running 4:25.2.

Payne also turned in outstanding efforts as she con-

tinued to establish state bests among Class A runners. She won the 100 meter dash and came back to turn in a 26.4 clocking in the 200 for the best time in the state this season.

Orr and Payne also contributed to a third place finish in the 400-meter relay along with Janelle McElhany and Padberg.

The boys also came up with outstanding efforts. The 400-relay team of Archie Lucas, Sid Kennedy, Eric Thompson and John Moyer turned in the third fastest time among District 7-A runners to place third with a 46.2 time.

Moyer added to that effort with a personal record in the long jump with a leap of 20'10" to take first place in that event and went on to place third in

the triple jump with a leap of 40'.

John Martin added points in the 800 and 1500 meter races. He placed fourth in the shorter race with a 2:06.5 time and posted the fastest time in the district at 1500 meters with a 4:21.4 time good for second place.

Other place finishers for the Heppner girls included Melinda Eubanks who earned a fourth in the discus and shot put; Padberg, sixth in the 800 meters; McElhany, sixth in the high hurdles; Lana Reid who turned in a season's best in the 3,000 meter run for fourth, and Sandra Wattenburger, fifth in the high jump.

Wattenburger also jumped to a personal best in the long jump of 14'5", just barely missing a place. Missy Gates also turned in a personal best at 3,000 meters but failed to place.
