Co. Court hears child care proposal

A new child care-preschool program for north Morrow County was proposed to County Court last Wednesday by Rick Gay of Blue Mountain Economic Development Council. The program would be for children aged three to five years with eligibility determined by the parents financial need. Funding would be provided by federal and matching county monies.

"We'll know whether (federal) funding will be coming in two or three weeks," Gay told the court. Gay introduced Sharon Carol to the court as the new B.M.E.D.C. employee who will oversee operation of the Heppner Neighborhood Center and receive reports from Pat Brindle, director of the center. The court then signed the Neighborhood Center Contract with B.M.E.D.C. In other news, the court: discussed a proposed build-

ing code ordinance which would restrict grading without a permit except in isolated or self-contained areas. signed the Patterson Deed with Guy and Kay Patterson regarding the widening of Willow Creek Road. signed an airport resolution: a Declaration of Necessity for Acquiring Certain Property for Airport Construction. The property in question needed for Lexington airport easements is owned by Mrs. Lee Wagonblast of Lexington.

Preschool screening clinics slated for May 30-31

Morrow County School District is sponsoring preschool screening clinics this month in Irrigon, Boardman, and Heppner. Speech, hearing, language, vision, motor skills, and child development screening will be provided in the clinics free of charge. Children entering school for the first time this fall are encouraged to attend the clinics.

Children younger than age four or five are also welcome to attend, especially if parents have any concerns about their child's speech, hearing, vision, motor skills, or growth and development, stated a school district spokesperson. Clinics will be held at A. C. Houghton School in Irrigon Tuesday, May 29, in Board-

Morrow County Pioneer Picnic Dohertys and helpers prepare

This is the fifth and final 1984 article about Morrow County's pioneer Doherty family that is hosting the annual Pioneer Reunion on Sunday, May 27, in the Pavilion Building at the County Fairgrounds. By 1883 Catherine (Grant) Doherty, widow of Francis, and their four children had migrated to Eastern Oregon from Cardonagh, one of the most northerly towns of County Donegal, Ireland. Their offspring now, in the sixth generation, have continued to be significant members of the agricultural areas and towns of Eastern Oregon and have spread into other states, too. Kate's younger daughter Mary married Michael Kenny from County Leitrim who had come to Oregon in 1878. In the early 1880's Mike had filed homestead rights on land in

the head of the most easterly branch of Sand Hollow, known as Milk Canyon. Beginning in a small one-room home the Kenny's managed well, increasing their holdings and filling a larger home with their seven children. Family members still farm their land. The oldest Kenny son Johnny and his wife "B" (Mollahan) are survived by their oldest son Eddy, who lives in Portland with his wife Rita. The first Kenny daughter, Irene Richards, a widow and mother of four, lives in McKinleyville, CA. Emmett Kenny and wife Betty have a daughter and live in Pendleton where he's worked with the telephone company. James Kenny retired from teaching, lives at Oswego with wife Judy; they are the parents of four. Pat (Kenny) and husband Charles Erwin have six

children and many grandchildren. Bill Kenny and wife, RN Marge, have raised their seven children in Heppner. Bill and several children still farm the homestead land in Milk Canyon. Bill and Marge have two grandchildren. Sadie (Kenny) married James Farley from County Longford. Their daughter Mary Clark had a daughter Mary Jean Moon who was killed in an accident. James and Mable Farley are in Pendleton where their son George has two children. The Farley twins, Margaret and Rosanna married, and Margaret Monahan now lives in Condon and has three sons, a daughter and grandchildren. Rosanna Applegate lives at Hood River and has a son Richard who has two sons. Joe Farley, wife Ruby and their daughter are living away from Morrow County. Roseanne (Annie) Kenny married James Healy from County Longford, and they became the parents of seven. Their son Tom, retired, lives in Heppner with brother Jack and wife Gwen. Marie is deceased but left children. Jack and Gwen raised three sons and two daughters in Heppner. Jack was long employed by Morrow County Grain Growers and Gwen works in the Wood Workers Union Office. CeCelia Healy is retired and living in Heppner. Helen married Harry O'Donnell, and they operated the title company in Heppner. Rosetta married Ted Palmeteer, and they farm out of lone where their son attended school. Bill Healy and wife Kite (Lazinka) raised their six daughters on part of the Kenny homestead land on Little Butter Creek. Bill and Kite now have several grandchildren who are part of the fast growing sixth generation of Kate Doherty's and then Mary Kenny's family.
