The Pioneer Memorial Hospital Foundation received seven applications for the Earl and Hazel Wilson Memorial Scholarship. The scholarship began one year ago with a bequest from the Wilsons, the interest from which is used to provide scholarships for students wanting to further their education in the field of medicine.

Hospital administrator John Ochsneer announced that all seven of the applicants were granted scholarships by the foundation board.

Recipients of the scholarships include three hospital employees: Mark Huntington, a lab technician who will use his \$400 scholarship to study micro biology; Delores D. McLachlan, a certified nursing aid, who will continue her studies toward becoming a licensed practical nurse with her \$600 scholarship; and Patricia VanSchoelack, a Licensed Practical Nurse, who will use her \$600 scholarship to continue studies in nursing.

Two recipients are 1984 Heppner High School graduates: Anne C. McLaughlin, who will use her \$400 scholarship to

study pharmacy; and Carlana K. Rathbun, who will also study nursing with her \$400 scholarship.

The final two recipients graduated from Heppner High School last year. Jennifer K. Johnston will use her \$400 scholarship to study nursing; and Gordon Hoffnagle, now of Irrigon will use his \$400 scholarship to study nursing.
