Last Saturday's Lone United Church of Christ Auction and Barbecue was termed, "the most successful auction we've had yet," by General Chairman Bill Rietmann. The day earned over \$12,000 which will be funneled through the general church budget into various church, mission, and community projects.

The Rev. Cathy Barker commented that "The outstanding thing this year was the spirit of cooperation. We had more workers and more enthusiasm than I've ever seen."

and pesticides. Diseases that will be identified and discussed include yellow dwarf virus, cereospora foot rot, stripe rust, and cephalosporium stripe. Tour stops will include both dryland and irrigated wheat.

Russ Karow, OSU Extension Cereal Crops specialist, and chemical company representatives will participate in the tour.

The tour will begin at 9 a.m. at the grain bin at the top of Stingel Canyon (Three-Mile Canyon) on Sand Hollow
